


Lemon Dessert (4-6 servings)

This should be made in advance since it has to set in the fridge.

Ingredients:

Juice and grated zest of 2 lemons 2 heaped tablespoons corn flour About 500 ml water

2 eggs (separated) 250 g caster sugar

Beat eggs whites until stiff. Combine everything else in a saucepan and bring to the boil, stirring frequently.

Simmer (and keep stirring) until thickened. Let it cool somewhat, then mix in the egg whites.

Pour into separate serving dishes and let it set in the fridge.

Serve with whipped cream and/or fruit.

Coconut Biscuits


Ingredients:

What a fabulous turn out of lambs, kids and calves this year - 86 animals filled the four rings. Thank you to all of our judges and stewards who did an amazing job.



Pukeko Preschool October 2012



IN YOUR GARDEN

Generally frosts have retreated making it safe to plant out tender vege seedlings and subtropical fruits. Spring growth will shortly be in full swing and in many areas well advanced, which means feeding is most important. Keeping weeds at bay and watching for insect pests is also important in early spring to prevent a catastrophe later on. Sow main season summer veges including tomatoes, melons, cucumbers, peppers, eggplant, and sweetcorn. In a sheltered corner, plant runner and dwarf beans, pumpkin, and zucchini. Plant successive batches of mesclun or summer lettuce every three weeks to maintain a regular supply of fresh salad greens.



Be prepared for damaging equinoctial winds by ensuring plants are well staked and seedlings well protected. Broad bean harvest begins. Pick young pods to slice like beans or leave for inner beans to mature. Snip mesclun lettuce mix and cut and come again regularly to promote fresh growth. Continue to harvest winter broccoli, cabbages and cauli.



Fabulous flowers, plant now a mix of annual bulbs and perennials to fill your garden and vases with fragrance and colour year round. Suggestions are, hellebores, petunias, queen annes lace, gladioli, hydranges, love in the mist, sweet peas, poppies, dahlias, nicotiana, cosmos, roses, lupins, tulips, polly daises, sunflowers, nasturtiums, carnations and delphiniums to name a few.

Its time to plant waterlily bulbs, plant them in a mixture of compost and grit in an old plastic pot or purpose made basket. Place in the pond to a suitable depth in still water, you may have to put a brick underneath.

Groom lawns, scatter fertilizer and weed. October is the best time to sow new lawn seed.

Make room for plants that are coming back to life after the winter chills. Protect plants such as Hostas with snail bait. A good tip is to place the bait in a screw bottle top and cover with a paua shell, or similar to keep the bait dry.

Tidy camellias, clear away blooms to combat disease, you may notice some late flowering camellias with brownish blooms — is it rain damage or has petal blight struck? Either way clean up the flowers and trim the bush.

Plant another batch of potatoes now, and keep mounding up previously planted ones.

Be safe. It's not just sunscreen you'll need from now on. Check your garden for hidden hazards. Cover sharp stakes with small pots to avoid eye injuries. Wear long gloves to protect arms from scratches or rashes. Clear pathways — you can't always see what's in front of you when you're carrying a bag of weeds.

U-Boat lurking in Lake Karapiro

At the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month 1918, the Armistice to end the First World War was signed. No country sent its soldiers as far as New Zealand did to fight in the First World War and few Countries Suffered such high losses.

Each year there is a celebration of New Zealand's military heritage hosted by the town of Cambridge. This year it is in the exciting new venue of the Mighty River Domain, Lake Karapiro. Featuring a wide range of activities for the whole family, this year the Royal New Zealand Navy will have a presence due to the availability of the lake.

The Navy is sending down a Seasprite helicopter and will also demonstrate the handling of the RIB, a coastal patrol vessel. Also present will be a collection of fully functioning privately owned tanks, including a Scorpion, WW2 Stuart and the very rare Abbot.

There is understood to be a U-Boat lurking in Lake Karapiro and a P-51 Mustang will make an appearance with the intention of locating and sinking the U-Boat. Protecting the submarine however it a Messerschmitt Me108, so a dog fight will be inevitable. All will be at low level for easy spectator viewing. There may also be a big surprise in store for spectators.

A particular crowd favourite each year is the militaria hall, where historic badges, uniforms, books and guns are bought, sold and swapped. This year a record number of tables have been booked for such yendors.

Reenactments of famous battles will take place at regular intervals, from WW1, WW2, the Boar War, Vietnam and there will even be a Romans Gladiator battle demonstrated.

A model competition is being run with fantastic prizes and the winners will be on display, along with radio controlled warships, which will be on the lake.

Also present will be the NZ Military Cadets (Army, sea and ATC) who will run their own competition and welcome all teens to consider joining. If the military may be a career option for a family member, the NZ

Armed Forces will have a recruitment caravan on site.

New Zealand in the First World War

As already mentioned, New Zealand suffered huge casualties in the First World War. The final tally of New Zealand casualties numbered 18,166 dead and 41,317 wounded, a total of 59,483 out of the 100,444 soldiers and nurses sent overseas. This was an enormous cost for a nation that in 1914 had an estimated population of a little over one million.

Armistice in Cambridge aims to not just celebrate the successes of New Zealand's military heritage, but also to commemorate the efforts of those who became casualties.

The Poppy in the logo

Armistice in Cambridge uses a poppy in its logo. The poppy's significance to Armistice Day, and to Anzac Day, is the result of John McCrae's poem 'in Flanders Fields'. The poppy emblem was chosen because of the poppies that bloomed across some of the worst battlefields of Flanders in the Great War, their red colour an appropriate symbol for the bloodshed of trench warfare.

As part of the event, a ceremony will be held at the Town Hall in Cambridge at 10a on the morning of the 11th to commemorate those who fell in the Great War. All welcome.

Bang! Fireworks frighten animals

Fireworks are enjoyed by people but can be a source of fear for many animals.



It doesn't have to be that way though, so don't ignore the problem. You can follow our top tips to make firework celebrations less frightening for your pet.

Keeping cats and dogs secure

- Make sure your dog or cat always has somewhere to hide if he or she wants to and has access to this place at all times. For example this could be under some furniture or in a cupboard.
- During firework seasons, walk dogs during daylight hours and keep cats and dogs indoors when fireworks are likely to be set off.
- At nightfall close windows and curtains and put on music to mask and muffle the sound of fireworks.
- If your pet shows any signs of fear try to ignore their behaviour. Leave them alone
 unless they are likely to harm themselves.
- Never punish or fuss over your pet when it's scared as this will only make things worse in the long run.
- Make sure your cat or dog is always kept in a safe and secure environment and can't escape if there's a sudden noise. Have your pet <u>microchipped</u> in case they do escape.

Don't forget small animals

- If your pets live outside, partly cover cages, pens and aviaries with blankets so
 that one area is well sound-proofed. Make sure that your pet is still able to look
 out.
- Provide lots of extra bedding so your pet has something to burrow in.¹

Remember to check the bonfire before lighting it to ensure no animals are hiding in the wood pile.

Farm Discussion Group report October 2012

Hi all I write this after a beautiful sunny and hot day hopefully it may be the start of a warmer spring, as it has not been to kind so far. Our last group was held at Dave Verytt's lease farm on Woodlands road. The topics up for discussion were water variation 6 and the effluent checks going on by environment Waikato plus the daily goings on, on the farm.

This was the second season of the lease on the farm and production is on the improve. The farm is now doing 1000 ms/ha with a target of 1200 as an on-going production level. We discussed how best to achieve this. Options were to grow more maize on farm as some needed regrassing, turnips or not and the option of bought in feed such as palm kernel or maize. General comments suggested growing feed on farm as this was the cheapest source especially if paddocks were poor to start with. Means getting 30 tonnes of DM/ha as opposed to 9 tonne. Overall the farm was looking great in a hard season and was set up well for mating.

We had a representative from Environment Walkato there to answer questions on Variation 6 and effluent issues. Variation 6 is all about applying for resource consent if you use more the 15000 litres of water a day per title to wash down your cowshed and water used to cool your milk. Most of us in this area do not exceed this and need not to do anything but it was suggested that you get a consent as in the future it will be helpful if they change the rules.

The other issue facing most of us peat farmers is that we are all getting visited by E.W who are looking at our effluent system to see if they are up to scratch as peat soils are seen as high risk for non-compliance. I have heard varying reports from these visits some with a couple of minutes warning of their arrival and some a couple of days. Also they have been asking farmers to prove there pond is not leaking even if it seems as if it is not. I have been in contact with other farmers in other areas with the same issue's and feel that we need to keep talking about this as a group as some of what they have been asking of farmers is unreasonable and we need to talk to fellow farmers of their experiences with E.W so we are all well informed on what changes need to be done. We as farmers do have a responsibility to look after the environment and need to keep improving out practices but this needs to be handled sensibly and in a realistic manner.

I am not sure of our next group at this stage but will be on the second Tuesday of November at 11am. See you all there.

Veterinarian care for calves, lambs and kids

Dehorning - most calves and kids will grow horns. These are felt as little stubs between the ears

when the animal is very young. The buds can be removed by a vet from two weeks of age however after 6 weeks of age full sedation will be requiring when dehorning.

Vaccinations - give us a call to discuss which inoculations are best for your animal. Generally we recommend 2 injections, 4 weeks apart of 7 in 1 vaccine starting at 12 weeks of age. We can also provide you with individual doses which you can administer to your animals yourself.



Parasites – worms can become a problem for your animals once they start to eat grass. To stop the first cycle of larval development you need to drench your calf or lamb after 3 weeks on pasture feed or out of the rearing shed. We recommend Arrest, available only from veterinarian clinics as poor on does not enable the calf to develop their immune system to fight larvae. We also recommend giving calves a 'Weaning Drench' once they are between 100-120kg of either Dectomax or Genesis Injection. Call us to discuss what suits your needs best.

Lice commonly occur in calves and needs to be treated if affected. You will see the animals rubbing and scratching against poles and losing the hair around their necks. Even if you only see one animal

affected with lice, treat ALL as they are highly




Docking/castrating - rubber elastrator rings can be used up to 2 months of age; however it is ideally done as young as possible. Ensure the ring is the correct size so any doubts, please check. We are happy to provide this service for you.

Zoonoses - this is the name given to diseases which

animals can pass onto humans. Good hygiene and protective clothing will be sufficient in most cases to prevent picking up the diseases. One of the biggest threats is leptspirosis. This is spread via infected urine and often the infected animal will be displaying no signs of symptoms so you have no idea they are spreading it.

Another big threat is stomach and intestinal infections, particularly from animals with diarrhoea. Wear gloves when handling sick or scouring animals, especially during the calf/lamb/kid rearing season and be sure to always wash your hands after being in contact with animals.



Consulting Officer Comment

The season has continued cool resulting in correspondingly slower than normal growth. This has caused some people a spot of bother. In fact many people. I know of one very good farmer who bought their first lot of supplement this spring on the 10th of October. They hadn't been feeding supplement since calving but things had got too tight feed wise. Unbelievable for mid October!



I don't have lots of actual data at the time of writing but it appears that submission rates have been pretty good despite the pretty variable pasture covers. This just proves the importance of good body condition at calving. It is the single biggest factor in determining reproductive performance.

The following DairyNZ organised events coming up in November are worth putting in your calendar. Some of these are once a year opportunities.

- 1) Dairy Effluent Field Day: An important Farm Dairy Effluent Field Day is being held at Jason & Lisa Suisted's farm, 1006 Woodlands Road on November 7th at 10:30am. This will be a practical look at upgrading dairy farm effluent systems to be compliant. Simple tips too on how to bring efficiencies so any changes needed and associated upgrade costs are minimised. Peat soils are classed as 'high risk' and are receiving increased attention by Regional Council inspectors. Get on the front foot and do some investigation as to what this may mean for your farm. This is a great opportunity to talk it over with independent DairyNZ specialists in this field.
- 2) Variation 6 Meeting re consents to take dalry shed wash down and cooling water: This is another hot topic and one you should have got a letter about from Regional Council a month ago. We had a discussion about this at last Discussion Group. This meeting is one of several DairyNZ is running in the Waikato to help dairy farmers understand what they need to do, if anything. Brigid Buckley of DairyNZ will



- speak and provide some tools she has developed to help farmers understand the implications for their farm, 7:00pm at the Gordonton Hall on Tuesday November 20th.
- The next meeting of the Eureka Discussion Group is Tuesday 13th November. Further details via text or on the website.

NEWS FROM YOUR WAIKATO DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

If you travel through Tauwhare village at night you will have noticed the **red 'cats eyes'** on either side of Tauwhare Road which are extremely effective as a marker for the road edging. It appears at this stage that they have had the desired effect of reducing motorists speed through the village and therefore reducing the accident rate. I wish Council had identified this option sooner as a safety measure.

Have you visited the latest market day in the district? Gordonton now has a Market Day on the second Saturday of each month. A large variety of produce and craft stalls are drawing large crowds. Even in the pouring rain on 13 October it was difficult to find a car park.

The *Christmas* decorations go up in *Woodlands Homestead* at Gordonton at the end of November. The homestead and café will be open every day through the holiday season except the statutory holidays – Christmas Day, Boxing Day, New Years Day and 2nd January. Woodlands estate is owned by the Waikato District Council and the gardens are open free to the public seven days a week: 10am – 4pm. There is a small entry fee to visit the homestead - \$5 per adult, children under 15 free.

Council has just let a five year contract for *fire security system inspection*, testing and maintenance. When the contract is put in place Hall Committees will be advised that they will no longer be responsible for arranging the servicing of their fire extinguishers etc. The servicing charge will be at a far better rate than individual hall committees would pay for servicing and will be charged against the rateable income received by each Hall Committee.

When the Expressway is built through the back of Huntly, the Huntly Gun Club will be relocated approximately 600 metres east from its current McVie Road site to 66 Evans Road.

The Inorganic Refuse Collection 2012 starts on Monday 29th October and will be completed on Saturday 1st December. The collection date for a property depends on the day of the week that the property receives its weekly refuse collection and these dates are listed on the information leaflet that will be delivered to all houses that get the normal weekly collection service. Any enquiries to the contractor, Metrowaste, on 0800 935 935.

Are you connected to the Southern Districts Water Scheme? It is important you check that no water is 'disappearing'. Did you know that a 'drip' a second is roughly 25 litres of water in 24 hours so this can add up very quickly? The Council reads water meters every six months so they recommend you read your own meter regularly to check your average water consumption has not increased which could indicate you have a leaking pipe or water fitting. Read the black on white digits – the red and white digits are partial units.

Would you like to drive your own car on a racetrack? Here's your chance. 




