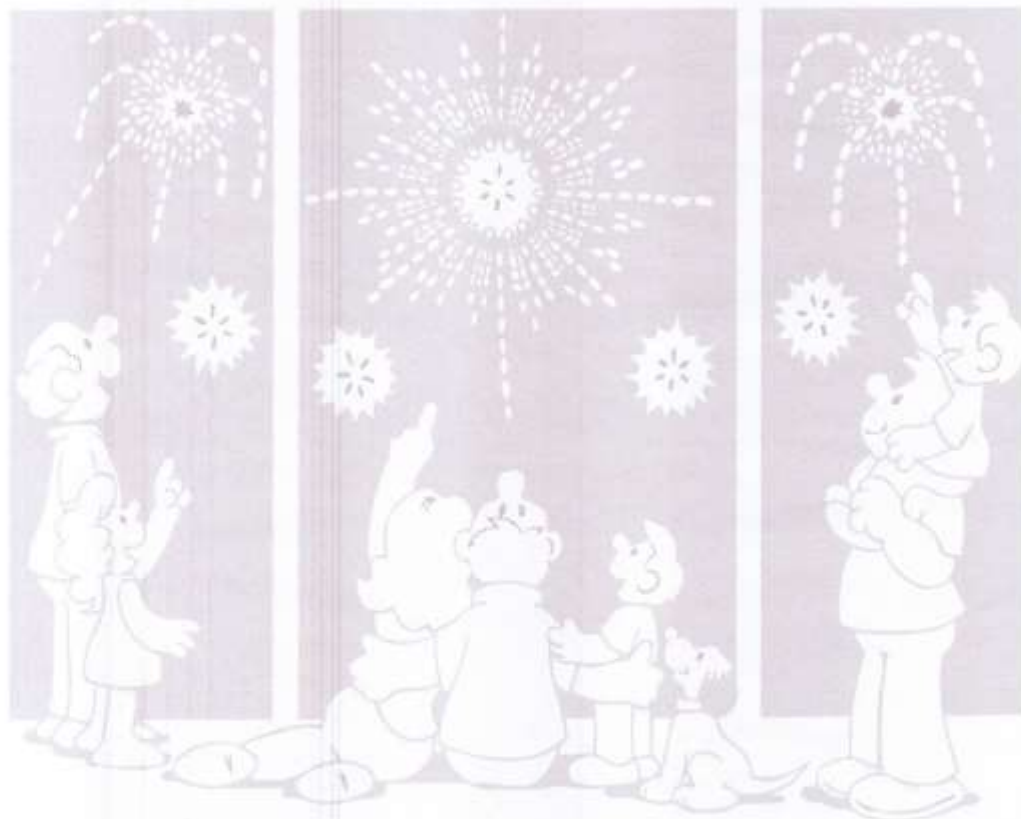

GUEST EDITORIAL

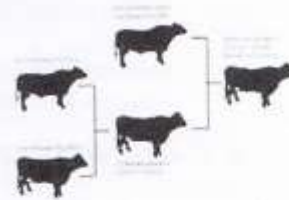
We have lived in the Eureka district for approximately 20 years on 15 acres on Schollum Road and now 93 acres on Tauwhare Road.

Also we belong to the Waikato Military Vehicle Club in which we have purchased a 1982 V8 Land rover.

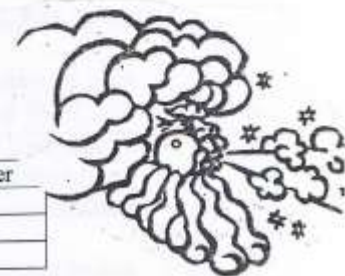
Tony is on the Frankton Rugby Club committee in Hamilton. He used to play for the club in his younger days, and enjoys watching rugby now.

The **Design A Costume** project evolved over eleven weeks and has been extremely rewarding for all involved. Through meaningful interactions with the teachers this project inspired the children to explore their ideas and experiment with materials, which in turn promoted independence, imagination, confidence, self-expression, creativity and a positive attitude toward learning.

NEIGHBOURHOOD SUPPORT - WHERE IS IT?

Last month I wrote about how Eureka might start on the first steps of preparing a Community Response Plan, to enable us all to know what to do when disaster strikes in the form of Civil Defence Emergency Management.

Obviously those in Eureka are sure that this will never happen, at least to them!!!

I got **not one single response** to my call for volunteers to help set up Neighbourhood Support Groups in the roads of Eureka. And my efforts to set one up in Hooper Road have been slow, to say the least. I now have 10 returned forms out of 22 households. At this rate it will take about seven years to see a response plan formed, and now I've been asked to lead the charge on creating one for the whole Eureka Ward, which includes us and four other districts.

Waikato District now has its own Emergency Management Coordinator in the person of Kelly Newell. She has a huge job to do, and it's not made any easier if people make no effort to help sort out arrangements for their own patch.

Last Saturday Hooper Road had a car burned out on the side of the road. No doubt it had been stolen, but just goes to prove that crime is alive and well and happening here. What if this had happened in last year's drought? We'd have had a widespread grass fire in no time.

So what disasters are we likely to face in Eureka?

We've already had tornadoes, and floods, and storm damage. An earthquake is a possibility, and there's always the likelihood of volcanoes popping off. A quote going the rounds among emergency management people is that if one of the Auckland ones leaps to life, the Waikato could see 650,000 Auckland refugees descending on us.

But the one we aren't at all prepared for, and we're surrounded by cloven hooved animals, is foot and mouth disease, or other unwanted import which affects such animals. Yes, we've never had it here, but whatever assurances the PKE importers put out, we have record numbers of tourists arriving from FMD affected countries, and from all accounts our biosecurity checking is nowhere near as rigorous as elsewhere, despite the Minister bumping up dog and staff numbers.

I've heard people say that MAF had it all sorted, but rest assured it's current version, MPI may be putting lots of effort into top level planning, but they haven't got round to telling communities what to do yet. Even their National Standstill document doesn't give advice to rural dwellers on how NOT to spread it around unwittingly. And with a disease which can be transmitted not just animal to animal but by wind, fodder, motor vehicles, as well as the clothes and skin of animal handlers, movement controls become very important.

Following my enquiries at MPI Wellington, I have now been advised by them that anything we can do to get community planning in place will greatly assist in limiting the spread of the disease. Remember, in the UK outbreak in 2001, new infections were found in 60 farms each day! And sheep were responsible for quite a lot of that, and farmers didn't even know they had it! If you talk to anyone who lived through that time in the UK (and I know of several) they still remember it with horror, and hope never to see it again.

So please, can I have some support from at least all the roads in Eureka, to set up Neighbourhood Support groups, compile lists of who lives where, so we can then move on to sorting out how we make contact (telephone trees, e-mail groups etc), what equipment is available throughout the district, where the welfare and relief centres will be, and get everyone clear on what they can and can't do.

As a start can someone from Hinton, Hunter, Friedlander, Schollum, Waverley Roads make contact with me, as well as the Eureka end of Tauwhare Road. We can then get started.

Just because nothing widespread has happened yet, doesn't mean it won't! And if we aren't prepared as a district/ward etc how will we know what to do?

LADIES A PLATE

10 Minute Couscous Salad

- 100g couscous
- 200ml hot low salt vegetable stock (from a cube is fine)
- 2 spring onions
- 1 red pepper
- 1/2 cucumber
- 50g feta cheese (small cubes)
- 2 Tablespoon pesto
- 2 tablespoon toasted pine nuts



Tip couscous into a large bowl, pour over stock and cover. Leave for 10 minutes until fluffy and all the stock has been absorbed while waiting for the couscous slice the onions and pepper, and dice the cucumber.

Add these to the couscous, fork through pesto, crumble in feta, then sprinkle over pine nuts to serve.

Applejack Cake

- 400g can diced apple
- 1 cup raisins
- 1 cup boiling water
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 125g butter
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 egg
- 1 1/2 cups flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder

Topping

- 75g butter
- 1/4 cup soft brown sugar
- 1/4 cup apple juice
- 1 1/2 cups shredded coconut



Place the apple, raisins, water and baking soda in a saucepan.

Bring to the boil and simmer for 2 minutes. Remove from the heat and mix in the butter, stirring until melted

Mix in the sugar and egg, beating with a wooden spoon until the egg is combined.

Sift the flour and baking powder into the mixture and mix to combine.

Line the bottom of a 20cm round cake tin with baking powder and pour in the mixture.

Bake at 180C for 40 minutes.

Remove from the oven and carefully spread the topping over the cake. Return to the oven and cook for a further 20 minutes or until topping is golden and an inserted skewer comes out clean

Cover with a clean tea towel and leave in the tin for 20 minutes before turning onto a cooling rack.

Topping

Melt the butter, and mix with the sugar, apple juice and coconut

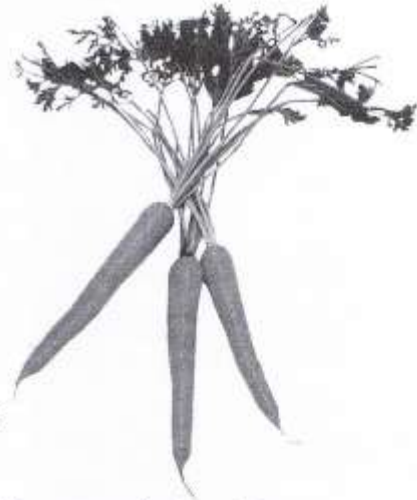

Carrots A Super Food



Carrots are one of the most nutritious root vegetables.

They are an excellent source of carotenes (their bright orange colour) and also an excellent antioxidant. These compounds protect against heart disease and cancer. Their high beta and alpha carotene levels gives them the ability to rejuvenate your skin and other organs.

During World War II, pilots were given large amounts of carrots to strengthen their eyesight, especially night eyesight. The beta-carotene converts to vitamin A in the body and help improve vision. People with low levels of vitamin A may suffer from night blindness, not only improving your vision carrots (vitamin A) helps protect your vision.

Carrots are also loaded with fibre and water which cleanse the liver, boost detoxification and plump out the skin to stave off wrinkles. The vitamin C and silica content of carrots is also valuable for keeping the skin youthful. The chromium found in carrots helps to stabilise blood sugar levels making this vegetable useful for controlling diabetes and sugar cravings.

There is debate as to whether they are more nutritious raw or cooked – you do lose some vitamins by cooking, like vitamin C.

IN YOUR GARDEN

Now that frosts have retreated it's safe to plant out tender vege seedlings and subtropical fruits. Spring growth is in full swing and in many areas well advanced, which means feeding is very important. Keeping weeds at bay and watching for insect pests is also important in early spring to prevent a catastrophe later on.



Continue to sow main summer season veges, including tomatoes, melons, cucumbers, peppers, eggplant and sweetcorn. Direct sow successive batches of mesclun or summer lettuce every three weeks to maintain a regular supply of fresh summer greens. Pre-sprout runner and dwarf beans and plant in a warm sheltered area. Plant pumpkin, zucchini and gherkins in a small amount of organic compost. Plant main-crop potatoes and bank up your early crop.

Keep protection going against damaging equinoctial winds. Ensure plants are well staked and seedlings well protected. Side-dress strawberries with compost and spray at fortnightly intervals with an eco-fungicide and keep up the slug and snail bait. Keep feeding tomatoes at fortnightly intervals and water frequently.

Broad bean harvest begins. Pick young pods to slice like beans or leave for inner beans to mature. Snip mesculan mix and cut and come again lettuce regularly to promote new growth. Continue to harvest winter broccoli, cabbage and cauliflower.



I know your vege garden is important, but don't forget colour for your flower garden. Picking now, Aquilegia, Lilac, Lavender, Pelargonium, Geraniums, Candytuft, Astilbe, Iris, Carnations, Poppies, just to name a few.

Plant now, Dahilas, Dianthus, Phlox, Campanula, Tuberosa, Petunias and of course Roses. The list is endless, just have fun.

Tasks: Hack back munched hosta leaves for fresh growth. Cut flowers off of agapanthus to prevent the spread of seed. Trim hedges and give a liquid feed. Plant new clematis and plant up pretty pots to give as Christmas presents. So go to it, gardening is beneficial and rewarding.

...Remember, remember, the fifth of November, Gunpowder, Treason and Plot ...

Well, we also need to remember about our pets at this time. It can be a frightening time for our pets with lots of loud sudden explosions occurring just outside their home.

Tips to help your pet cope with the firework season:

- Keep your pet inside from dusk until midnight at least.
- Create a cushion of sound around them by having the television on slightly louder than normal to help diminish the impact of outside noises on your pet.
- If you are going out then leave the radio and television on for your pet, again to create a cushion of noise around them.
- If you are going out and you know your pet can get upset, put them in a safe room where they can do little damage to themselves or the house, eg bathroom. Dogs have been known to try to chew their way out of a house!
- Use plug in pheromone diffusers, such as DAP for your dog or Feliway for your cat, to help calm and settle them as much as you can in the approaching days to the fireworks season.
- How can I tell if my pet is stressed? Well, they might show abnormal behaviour changes, for example dogs might bark inappropriately and cats might start over grooming or urinating in strange, inappropriate places.

PennHip Certification

Gabe is now fully certified as a PennHip Radiographer.

The Penn Hip system was pioneered in USA in the 1980's and has greatly reduced the incidence of hip dysplasia in dogs. This is a new screening process for reviewing hip dysplasia. It is the most accurate hip screening method available and can be safely performed on dogs as young as 16 weeks – invaluable if you are planning to breed from your dog. Currently the old system of radiographic analysis has not done a great deal to alter the occurrence of hip dysplasia in our pure breed dogs. In fact, the NZVA will only be accepting PennHip radiographs for registered dogs from the New Year.

EUREKA FARM DISCUSSION GROUP

Well what a season it has been. A start only we can dream of and long may it continue. Our last discussion group was held at Graeme Davison No 2 farm on Holland road. The day had a good plan with Jane Kaye there to give advice on dairy nutrition and mating under way and plenty of grass to deal with.

We started out with an overview of Graeme's farm system and how staff is managed, their roles within the business and how this was co-ordinated. Graeme had got systems in place and the staff are working very well with this plan and showing that communication on large farms is very important.

Mid-way through mating and things were on track for a good submission rate targeting an in calf rate of 80% in 6 weeks which is what the farm achieved last season. This is not achieved by accident as the farm follows the incalf program with Anexa with great results. Silage had been made on the farm already and more silage was ready to be cut, a big focus on this farm was residuals being at 1500kg dm/ha and grass quality on the farm looked great.

Jane Kay a scientist from Dairy NZ spoke very well about nutrition in the spring. She had some good information about the price of feed we could pay and related this to the residuals the cows were leaving. What I got out of this was that even on an \$8 payout in the spring it was marginal to feed anything at a cost of 30 cents of dry matter unless the cows are grazing under 1600kd dm/ha. Another point I took out of this was that there is no need to feed fibre during the spring as there is plenty in grass and the reason for excreting so watery is an excess of protein and water and the cow cannot absorb it all and therefore discharges all the excess. Grass is awesome so make the most of it before you add anything to their diet.

We had a great BBQ supplied by the ANZ Bank at the end of the day and a good catch up with fellow farmers at this busy time of year.

CO Comment for Eureka Express

For once my comments are written the day before printing, rather than a week or two before, so it is right up to date. The only reason for that is I clean forgot the deadline and lovely Editor Gail phoned to see if I was contributing anything this month. Oops.

Driving to discussion group today from Hamilton to Orini it became painfully clear how fast things are changing on farm. It really hit me how quite a few farms were really decking their paddocks. Pasture growth has slowed because of a lack of rain, there are less paddocks in the round with crop paddocks out (stocking rates are effectively up 5% - 15%) and some of the silage has been late coming off due to the amount of silage being made in late October.

Soils are "Dry"

The host farmer today mentioned how his clay soils had some moisture in the top 6 inches but below that they were quite dry. Other farmers commented how their drains were running low. Is this sufficient evidence to think there will be a drought? Well, no not really but it is concerning.

In terms of actual data, I saw NIWA's soil moisture deficit information for Paeroa area yesterday. It had 10 year trends as well as the last 2 years plus this year so far. The normal trend is for the soil moisture to plummet quite steeply in early November. This year that trend began 2-3 weeks earlier and supports farmers comments above.

Supplements at an \$8 payout

At groups recently I have been commenting on supplement use at an \$8 milk price. Obviously it is more economic now than at \$6 to the tune of about 100kg DM/ha higher residuals. i.e. whereas in previous years, the breakeven point for supplements tended to be around 1500 kg DM/ha, this year, with the higher predicted milk price, it is closer to 1,600 kg DM/ha.

With PKE at around \$290 - \$310/t delivered on farm at present, it makes good sense (or an equivalent value supplement) to use it if the cows are sufficiently hungry i.e. grazing residuals of 1,500 kg DM/ha or less.

Bearing in mind that supplements produce different ratios of protein and fat in the extra milk solids they generate, the following feeds are of approximately equal return at a 1500 residual. Maize grain at \$540/t and 12.5 ME Meal at \$460/t fed in-shed, PKE at \$310/t and Maize Silage at \$350/t DM fed on a feed pad.

The factors affecting the viability of supplement feeding are:-

- The cost of the supplement/MJME
- How hungry the cows are if the supplement wasn't fed (best measured by grazing residuals)
- The level of wastage (storage and feeding out)
- The ratio of protein/fat that the supplement produces.

The one you have the biggest control over is feeding supplements at a time when the cows are hungry enough to give a good return. You might like to take stock right now and plan any needs over the next month or so. Perhaps it is going to rain and supplements won't be necessary. Then again it might not. You read the crystal ball.

For those of you on peat only soils, you might like to book into the bus trip on November 7th to look at what farmers are doing or contemplating doing for effluent storage solutions. A range of specialists as well as farmers who have been doing a lot of thinking and homework, will be on the bus. You must book a seat by ringing me or emailing ben.turner@dairynz.co.nz. NEWS FROM YOUR WAIKATO DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

I was delighted to be returned as Councillor for Eureka Ward at the recent elections. During the **next three years** I will continue to work with the four Community Committees, schools and other groups in the Ward, investigate interest in creating a Community Committee for Puketaha, assist with the work Sue Edmonds has initiated to create an Emergency Plan for Eureka Ward, work with the community around the effects that the Expressway and inland port will have on residents, and other issues of importance to those living in Eureka Ward. Council is also working on a draft Community Engagement Strategy to improve our links with the community.

The final **voter turnout** in the elections in Waikato District was 31%. In Eureka Ward 3434 residents were enrolled to vote; of these 1017 voted – 29.6% of those on the roll.

Representation was reviewed during the last term and as a result the boundaries of nine wards were adjusted, the wards of Onewhero and Whaingaroa were merged and the number of councillors reduced from 14 to 13.

The Mayor and 13 Councillors were sworn in on Tuesday at a ceremony in Ngaruawahia. There are three new Councillors – Janet Gibb for Ngaruawahia Ward, Rosemarie Costar for Onewhero-Te Akau Ward and Jacqui Church for Awaroa ki Tuakau Ward.

The Council's **Committee structure** has been adjusted in line with a Council restructure and along with membership on the Infrastructure, Policy and other statutory committees I am part of a new Discretionary & Funding Committee, continue in my role on Waikato Regional Council's River Liaison Sub Committee (Middle Waikato River) and a new appointment to represent WDC on the Mairaki Gulf Forum Committee.

There are some interesting stats in the latest **Link**. There is 418,893ha of land in Waikato District Council. Our boundaries stretch from Bombay in the North, Tamahere in the south, Raglan in the West and the Thames estuary in the north east. 2,447km of roads service this area so you can appreciate how far our roading budget has to stretch. Once the Expressway is completed a large number of roads, currently designated as state highways, will return to the District Council roading stock, including SH1b which goes through Eureka Ward.

Waikato District has **200 parks and reserves** for residents to use free of charge. Woodlands Historic Homestead and Gardens in Whitiakahu Road, Gordonton are Council owned and the reserve is open seven days a week, 10am – 4pm, for you to visit. There are designated areas for picnics (check at the office in the homestead) and you can wander through eight acres of historic gardens. The Woodlands garden is a New Zealand Gardens Trust *Garden of National Significance* and well worth a visit. There is a small charge to enter the homestead; entry to the gardens is free. You may also like to become a member of Woodlands for a small yearly subscription. Visit their website for more information www.woodlands.co.nz The on site café is open Tuesday – Sunday 10am – 4pm.

The **2013 Inorganic Refuse Collection** is due to start on 4th November. A flier will be placed in your mail box with details. I note from a memo I have received that the Eureka collection is likely to be scheduled for the week 18 – 23 November. However **check the dates** on the flier you receive which will also give you details of items that will be collected and items they will not take. A pile must measure no more than two metres long by one metre wide and one metre high. Material excess of this amount will be left behind. If you have any questions you can phone Metrowaste on 0800 223 243.

If you are connected to the **Southern Districts water scheme** you were surveyed for your opinion on **fluoridation** in the water supply.

As I mentioned in previous newsletters around 2,500 ratepayers were surveyed and their votes were considered with the votes from Hamilton city residents. **Of the 1,263 responses received:**

- 965 voted for fluoride being added to Hamilton city's public water supply
- 295 voted against
- 3 had no view

These results were forwarded to Hamilton City Council on 11 October before the voting closed to be included with the Hamilton City poll. We now await a decision from the newly elected City Council.

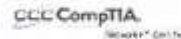

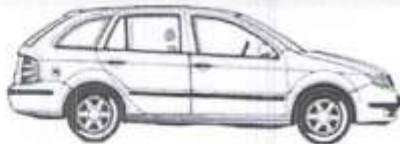
