work but it is always worth it to see a healthy litter of puppies.


It is great to see the generations in our breeding and I am looking forward to running a new puppy on.



IN YOUR GARDEN

How Long Does It Take To Grow A Rose Bush From Start To Finish

Hi Mike from Roach's Nurseries. 3rd generation rose grower.

The 1^{st} step is to collect rose stock cuttings which are multiflora root stock to bud or Graft on to.

To start bush roses we cut the multi flora stock canes into 30cm lengths with a band saw. While the staff is doing this the paddock is worked up to a fine till and then rolled lightly.



We then proceed to lay black polythene which is about 60 cm wide, the rows being about 1.4m wide.

The stock cuttings are then disbudded or de eyed, this is a sit down job with a very sharp knife. All buds are removed from the bottom of the cutting leaving 2 buds at the top. The disbudded stock is then left in a dark bin until white callusing starts at the bottom of the cutting.

From there they are then planted in holes premade in the polythene which are 14cms apart. Standard roses have the same process but the stock is 1.2m tall. Nice straight canes are made to length on a table. These are also disbudded, leaving 3 buds at the top.

Planting is done between June and August. At Christmas-January the budding of the stock begins.

We collect the buds from previous rose plants budded last season, which we call our budwood. If for example we are budding Aotearoa, we collect branches from half spent flowers, cut the leaves off and take the prickles off the branches collected. The average stick has 5 buds one under each leaf.

We have people come from overseas to do our budding. They are professionals and spend all year budding around the world and are contracted by us to do our budding.

One month after budding we cut the stocks back by a few cms above the bud and remove their tops. These will grow to a mature rose by Christmas.

The plants are then wrenched the following year in May and potted up and sent out to Garden Centres

from June to November.

It has taken 2 years to produce a rose plant.

We pay a royalty on % of our roses grown. Royalties last for 23 years for each royalty variety. We pay this on roses budded whether the plant is dead or alive. Numbers are checked yearly to make sure that they are correct.

Why do I grow roses. It is like farming or other forms of horticulture – next year will be better

125g Butter 1 cup Desiccated Coconut 250g pack Milk Arrowroot biscuits 3 tsp Natural Lemon Essence 1/2 cup Sweetened Condensed Milk

ICING

1 1/2 cups Pure Icing Sugar 20g melted Butter 1 tbs Natural Lemon Essence 2 tbs Desiccated Coconut



METHOD

STEP 1: In a small saucepan heat butter and sweetened condensed milk on a gentle heat until butter is melted and mixture is combined.

STEP 2: Crush biscuits finely or process in food processor.

STEP 3: Add coconut to biscuit mix and mix well, add the warm milk and butter mixture and Queen Lemon Essence and mix well until all combined.

STEP 4: Hand press firmly into a greased 18cm x 28cm slice tin, allow to set in fridge for an hour.

STEP 5: To make icing, combine the sifted icing sugar, melted butter and Queen Lemon Essence and mix well, add enough warm water until you get a thick smooth paste.

STEP 6: Remove set slice from fridge and ice with lemon icing and sprinkle with coconut. Allow to set for a couple of hours and slice into pieces to serve.



- Put your refuse bags and recycle bin out by 7:30am
- There is no collection on a statutory holiday. Your collection will be one day late.

Refuse Collection Guidelines

- We only collect two plastic bags from each house
 - These are the black bags available from supermarkets
- We don't collect from wheelle or rubbish bins
- We don't collect multi wall paper bags
- We don't collect bags weighing more than 20kg

 - Phone Walkato District Council on 07 824 8633 or 0800 492 452

Recycle Collection Guidelines

IMPORTANT: The only bin that will be emptied is the green bin supplied by the Council. Bottles in cardboard boxes left beside the bin will not be collected for safety reasons.

Please empty bottles from beer boxes in to the green bin.

IN the recycle bin

- Glass bottles, jars (no window glass, broken glass or light bulbs)
- Plastic, household containers, types 1, 2 and 5 only
- Please rinse and squash containers put lids in refuse
- Aluminum and steel cans, empty aerosol cans, foil plates
 - Please rinse and squash containers

BESIDE the recycle bin

- Put papers in to supermarket bags with the handles tied and placed beside your bin.
- Cardboard boxes must be flattened, tied in a bundle not exceeding 500mm wide, and be positioned beside your bin.

Frequently Asked Questions About Recycling

Need another bin?

Additional bins can be purchased from Council's Ngaruawahia office

Can I put paper and cardboard in the green bin?

Paper and thin card should be placed in a supermarket bag with handles tied, and placed on top of your bin. Larger cardboard should be securely bundled and placed beside the green bin

Why do I need to rinse containers?

Rinsing helps recycling by reducing contamination and food leftovers can attract flies or animals and spread disease. A cold water rinse is usually enough.

Why should I squash containers?


Flattened cans and plastic bottles are less likely to blow around in the wind and cause litter. Unsquashed items also take up a lot of space in both your bin and the collection truck.

Why remove lids?

Lids are usually made from different plastic or metal and so they may not be able to be recycled along with the container. Taking lids off also helps when processing the collected containers by ensuring the container is empty and makes processing safer.

What if my recycling does not get collected?

Non-complying materials will be left in the container with a sticker explaining the reason for noncollection. If you believe that the collection has missed your property phone Council 0800 492 452.



Consulting Officer Comment

Despite the dry summer biting quite hard at present, dairy farmers generally seem quite upbeat. We are getting quite used to these dry events. Mainly, though, the positive mind set is due to farmers preparedness for these dry spells with good stocks of supplement on hand, or about to be harvested (maize), AND a clear plan of the other options available to try and balance feed demand with feed supply.

It has been a good season to date and milk prices are strong relative to supplement prices. Not only are there options, because there is cash in the bank, but supplement spending at the moment is generally profitable.

On 11th of February the Discussion Group met at Mark and Hayley van Hellemond's who sharemilk on the Mace farm on Waverley Road. We saw a really well run dairy farming business with excellent all round performance. The farm is heading for a record season and with Mark & Hayley's ability to produce milk solids at 50c/kg less than the Waikato sharemilkers average, has enabled them to be in the top 10% for operating profit which is no mean feat.

One feature of the van Hellemond's management is the use of Once-A-Day milking from early January each year. They seem to have it sussed. They went onto OAD when the herd was still doing 1.7 kg/cow and while the somatic cell count jumped from 150,000 to 300,000 for a couple of days it soon settled down and now sits around 130,000. A key to this successful transition to AOD milking is continuing to feed the cows really well.

We also had a guest speaker from Hazardco. This commercial company provides advice and resources to help farms and businesses meet their requirements under the health & safety act in a simple and easy way. There was some good debate about motor bike helmets and who really is responsible on farm re hazards. Staff, Sharemilker or Owner?

One thing is for sure the farm needs to have the main hazards identified and staff aware of them and trained in how to deal with them. You also need some sort of simple method of recording that this has taken place in case you need to prove what you have done in the event of an accident.

Upcoming events:

Next Eureka Discussion Group is at Richard and Christine Lansdaal's at the end of Motumaoho Station Road. Plenty to discuss on this farm plus we will end with a "shed shout" by ANZ as the Lansdaals built a new shed and effluent ponds at the start of the season.

Since June 2013 Council has been working on a discussion document for the *Draft Waikato District Council Dog Control Bylaw 2014 and Policy on dogs*. Community Boards and Committees, the NZ Kennel Club, Federated Farmers, Veterinarians and other relevant parties will be consulted. The Waikato District and Franklin District bylaws have both been reviewed prior to consultation and will be combined into one Bylaw.

At a meeting held this week the Policy & Regulatory Committee considered amendments to Council's speed bylaws. A Road Safety Engineer was commissioned to review 17 sections of road within the district. Roads within Eureka Ward that were reviewed were - Tauwhare Road on the eastern side of Matangi Village, Tauwhare Road (Tauwhare Pa) and Scotsman Valley Road.

Recommendations were:

- Install 70kpm from existing 50kph on the eastern side of Matangi Village for 500 metres
- · Retain current 100kph on Scotsman Valley Road
- Install 70kph at the current 80kph location and also extend 70kph on to Ringer Road for 350m.

A period of consultation will now take place, with the Community Committees being consulted. A further report will then go to Council for finalization of the adopted bylaw. If any submissions are received regarding the amendments a further Hearing will need to be conducted.

Walkato District Council has been listening to residents of the District re the *proposed psychoactive substances policy*, which is a result of the Council wanting to restrict the sale of legal highs in the district. 300 + submissions had been received by this week

Council is completely against the sale of these substances but as the government has not created a law against them, having a strong policy in place is the only tool available to us. The Psychoactive Substances Act 2013 (the Act), passed by Government, allows for community input into where retailers of legal highs may be located. What we are talking about here are addictive, mindaltering substances that can and do have fatal results, so Council has been seeking input into Waikato district's response to this Act. The decision about whether a business can or cannot sell them is made by the independent Psychoactive Substances Regulatory Authority.

The Council's proposed policy aims to restrict the location of retail stores selling legal highs to commercial zones in Ngaruawahia, Huntly, Raglan, Te Kauwhata and Tuakau and keep them out of residential areas. The retailers would not be allowed within 50 metres of 'sensitive sites', e.g. places predominantly frequented by families and/or people under 18 years old, and can't be within 100 metres of another retailer selling the substances.

Government legislation effective from last July stipulates that legal highs cannot be sold from dairies, supermarkets, service stations or liquor outlets, and cannot be sold to anyone under 18. Manufacturers and retailers require licences and are required to list the ingredients. It is anticipated that hearings on the WDC policy will be held in late February 2014.

Waikato District has 200 parks and reserves for residents to use free of charge. Woodlands Historic Homestead and Gardens in Whitikahu Road, Gordonton are Council owned and the reserve is open seven days a week, 10am – 4pm, for you to visit. There are designated areas for picnics (check details at the office in the homestead) and you can wander through eight acres of historic gardens. The Woodlands garden is a New Zealand Gardens Trust Garden of National Significance and well worth a visit. There is a small charge to enter the homestead; entry to the gardens is free. You may also like to become a member of Woodlands for a small yearly subscription. Visit their website for more information www.woodlands.co.nz

Reminder - Waikato District is currently in a restricted fire season. If you wish to light a fire in a rural area we recommend you plan ahead as permits can take up to five working days to process.

The new 12.3km Ngaruawahia Section of the Waikato Expressway opened in December and has drawn very positive responses. Due to its location well away from the public eye it has been a surprise to many using it for the first time. It was built over three years at a cost of \$200m and features seven bridges, including six overbridges and a new 142 metre bridge over the Waikato River.

Until the Huntly and Hamilton Sections of the Expressway are completed the only connections to the existing road network are at the northern end of Gordonton Road at Taupiri and the Te Rapa Section at the Horotiu interchange at the southern end. The target opening for the Cambridge section is late 2016 and the Hamilton section 2019.

Cycling – you will be aware there have been a number of cyclist fatalities in the District in recent years. Regional meetings have been held to discuss issues for cyclists on rural roads. MP David Bennett MP instigated one of these meetings. A survey, predominantly targeting cycle clubs and schools that train on rural roads, is currently being developed by our Road Safety Coordinator, Megan Jolly. It is hoped to identify key routes and issues faced by these cyclists. Meetings will be ongoing.







