

GUEST EDITORIAL



Update on the 'Share the Park' Campaign

Visiting the Sculpture Park at Waitakaruru Arboretum is a breath-taking sensory art-in-nature experience. Those of you who have visited in the past know that the 17.5 hectares is a 25-year long rehabilitation of the old Winstones' Quarry that makes a great family walk among the sculptures and thousands of trees planted throughout. John and I want it to be shared as a free-entry public park that more people can enjoy, provided the cost of maintenance can be covered.

The 'Share the Park' Campaign started on the 22nd of January when the project was launched on Boosted, the Arts Foundation's crowd-funding site. This raised \$8000 for the initial impartial reports and strategy. There were 64 donors ranging in contributions from \$10 to \$1000.

At the same time we had a survey running. 190 people filled in the survey. The results include rating of the park (4.5 out of 5 overall), frequency of use, origin of visitors, etc. In addition, 40 people filled in the survey on paper at a trial run on Boxing Day.

We had four free to enter open days (Anniversary Weekend & Waitangi day). We counted 1000 visitors during those days (adults and children). On Waitangi Day alone we had over 400 visitors.

The contractors who are undertaking the impartial reports are:

- Accountancy firm BDO Waikato Ltd. to assess the cost of park maintenance
- Health & Safety Connexions Ltd. to assess the safety measures for the park

These reports will ready by end of March.

Artists have been coming into the park throughout February and early March, drawing and painting within the park and there will be an exhibition of their work called 'The Sculpture Park comes to Town', opening on the 11th May at the Nancy Caiger Gallery in the Meteor. It is at this event we would want to provide supporters with more of an insight into how we will try to find the funding to cover maintenance costs.

EUREKA EXPRESS AGM REPORT

The 38th Annual General Meeting of the Eureka Express was held on 14th March 2018 at the Eureka0 Hall. Ten residents attended the meeting which was chaired by Editor Gail Mayall.

Income for the 2017 financial year was \$3,460.50; Cash expenditure \$3,742.45 - a loss before depreciation of \$281.95. The loss was mainly due to a change in payment method for the photocopying from a monthly service charge to a monthly lease due to a decision by the Committee to lease a photocopier for five years rather than purchase a new one. A lease was deemed to be the most cost-effective method of replacing the copier.

The Express Committee also paid \$1,304.56 towards the cost of an AED unit for the community.

Bank balances at the end of the financial year were - Encore account \$4,044.44, Simple Saver account \$11,029.63. Advertising charges will remain the same. Funds are still being held for chairs for Eureka Hall.

For the first time in 38 years printing was missed in June 2017 when the photocopier 'died'. An extra, Christmas issue was therefore printed in December to compensate advertisers who pay for advertising in 10 issues.

The Editor outlined the events organized by the Eureka Express team in 2017 including the Annual Easter colouring competition, the very well supported Ladies Night and the launch of the AED unit and AED and CPR training provided by St John Morrinsville.

A revamped Eureka Express website is now online at eurerkaexpress.co.nz where you can read past issues of the Express, keep up with events, read the Eureka History Book and other items of interest.

Guest editorials continued and are a feature of the Express enjoyed by all and the Editor thanked those who contributed. She acknowledged the meticulous care of the Express accounts by Treasurer Gayle Orr who has stood down from the position. Glenys Middlemiss has taken on the role of Treasurer. Gayle will remain on the Committee. Sheryll Gordon who reviews the Express accounts, Wendy Morch for her work preparing advertisements, Anna Drever who designs the covers, Lorraine Morrison who is a huge help on printing day, Margaret Smith and Jill McGuire for their assistance with editing and typing and who, with Sue Marshall help on printing days. Also to the other Committee members who make a big contribution to the smooth running of the Express; also Waikato Sheds, Eureka Motors and other advertisers, regular and new contributors and those who assist with delivering the Express each month. The Committee is also grateful for the many donations they receive from past and present residents of Eureka.

The Editor commented the Express Committee would welcome new ideas and suggestions

from the community.




UBICAC MODEL COUNTRY SCHOOL






Swimming Sports

CORN AND CAPSICUM FRITTERS

1 large red capsicum

2 tbls parsley, coriander, chives


3 eggs

2-3 fresh corn cobs, kernels oil for frying salt and pepper, to taste

METHOD:

Cut the kernels off the cob. Chop up the capsicum into small dice. Heat 2 tbs oil in a pan, and add corn, stir for 2 mins. Add capsicum and stir for another 2 mins. Transfer into a bowl add herbs and mix. In another bowel beat eggs with salt and pepper. Gradually stir eggs into corn and capsicum mix. Drop large spoonful's of final mix into fry pan and cook 1-2 mins each side till golden brown. Serve with sour cream.

MUSHROOM AND TOMATO TARTS

1 sheet ready rolled pastry

2 tbs oil

2 cloves of garlic


4 cherry tomatoes

2 tbs soft cream cheese 100g button mushrooms sliced ½ tsp mixed herbs 1 tbs grated parmesan cheese

METHOD:

Preheat oven to a hot 240 C. Cover baking tray with tin foil.

Cut pastry into quarters, fold edges over to make a 1cm boarder and press down firmly. Spread cream cheese over pastry. Heat oil in a pan and add mushrooms and herbs. Stir over medium heat till mushrooms softened and lightly golden. Drain on paper towels. Arrange mushrooms over cream cheese, top with tomato and sprinkle with cheese. Bake for approx. 20 mins till puffed and golden



Spectre/Meltdown - time to upgrade for old OS users

If you're a regular bloke/lass and operate outside of technical computer circles, you might not have heard of a couple of terms currently haunting the computing world: "Spectre", a recently-discovered security flaw that affects most computer CPUs (Central Processing Units) and "Meltdown", another security flaw which only seems to affect Intel CPUs. Earlier last year, another flaw was detected called "Rowhammer".

While Rowhammer was relatively easy to mitigate, the difference between it and the newer flaws is that the fixes for the new problems cause significant performance problems, particularly on older computers. This is an issue currently impacting all areas of computing worldwide – as a 1-30% performance decrease (depending on the type of computer and it's assigned tasks) for almost all computers is bad news, not just for companies, but also for power grids and the environment.

So should you be worried? Probably not. Both Apple and Microsoft have issued security patches to address these issues, so while you may experience some small slowdown of your computer (testing has shown the impact is low for a typical home user), you should be safe security-wise. However if you're running an older operating system like Windows XP or Vista, and it's connected to the internet, you should upgrade, as patches will not be issued for it. If you need advice on how to do so, feel free to get in touch.

So why are these patches so necessary? Well, the security flaws basically allow hackers to take control of computers without the user even realising it, and they also leave no trace once the hackers are finished. They can (and will) be used in everything from industrial espionage to government manipulation, to stealing people's data including credit card details. Hopefully, given that the issue has been attacked so forthrightly by the IT community, the ability of hackers to exploit these hardware-level security issues will be significantly reduced.

As long as the majority of the world's computer are immune, the threat is relatively low. However in countries like China where at least 15% of all computers are still running Windows XP, it could be an issue. If you personally are still running XP or Vista and have been waiting for the right time to upgrade your computer, now is that time — unless it's a computer that doesn't connect to the internet. It's unlikely you'll be targeted, but why take that risk? Otherwise, just make sure your computer's operating system is receiving updates as it should, and there's no need to be afraid of Spectres or Meltdowns.

Installing your internal bullcrap detector

I didn't think I'd be returning to this issue so soon, but it's a problem that appears to be increasing. There are some new tactics from scammers, some of which rely on hacking and others on blind luck. Last year a young nz woman got a call from her husband's phone, telling her he was in custody at an airport and she needed to pay a large fine to get him out, which she did. How could she have known that the scammers had fooled the phone network into making it look like the call was from his phone? That her husband was fine and the whole thing was a setup?

Well, for starters, she could have called the airport directly to verify. She could've asked them to put him on the phone, or for a piece of information which only he could verify. Nowadays we have scammers targeting us over phone, email, on social media and dating apps. Some scams are dumb, some scams are smart, and some are targeted towards specific individuals (also known as "spear-phishing"). Amidst all of this it would be easy to just throw up your hands and say "it's all too much, how can I ever be safe, etc", retreat from the modern world and become a hermit, shut away in a cave until a nuclear apocalypse arrives.

Look. The world's always been this way. There've always been pirates, con artists and scumbags, it's just that now, the pirates are in Somalia, the con artists are in India (and sometimes Russia and China) and the scumbags are in the Whitehouse. But they're not robbing you in the street and you are not defenceless. The best deterrent for any scam is a well-installed, fully-functional bullcrap-ometer. When someone calls you with a foreign accent and says there's something wrong with your computer, you should be asking "how did they find out?", "would it be legal for them to find out that way?" and "would a legitimate company act like this?".

Likewise if someone emails to say you've inherited half a million dollars, logically-speaking, the chances of that being true are half a million to one, so your bullcrap-ometer should be beeping. If something seems too good, too bad, or too implausible to be true, it probably Isn't True. In other words, develop your critical faculties, your ability to critique situations instead of simply reacting with emotion. Critique at what I'm writing here: ask yourself, what does Matt have to gain by telling you all this stuff? Well, for starters hopefully I gain your trust, which may very well give me business, but also makes me feel good for having helped others.

But were I trying to scam you, I would tell you that there's some specific procedure or software package which will solve all your problems and make you entirely safe, which I can provide. There isn't such a thing, though there are plenty of things that help mitigate threats like antivirus programs, not sharing contact details on social media and not re-using passwords between websites. The Real solution is to use your head: educate yourself on the types of scams out there, install your bullcrap-ometer, and don't get caught out. Get smart instead.



IN MY GARDEN

Let's talk about the nursery industry. 40 years ago, my father was growing 180 thousand rose plants about 80 thousand fruit trees, shelter and hedge plants including

100,000 Phebalium hedge plants. Some people loved them others hated this hedge.




A little about how the above are grown. Cuttings are collected off an established hedge then taken back to the shed. Staff would sit around a fire in front of the shed, as it was the middle of winter and cut up cuttings about 15cm long. Late afternoon we healed these cuttings into rows of pumice dug out by spade. Each row was about was 3 meters long. When

planted each row was trampled in firmly. Then the next row was dug out about 5cm apart and same is repeated. These cuttings would take about 2 weeks for maybe 6 people to produce and healed in. When cuttings had grown a good root system. The ground was prepared ready to plant. Approximately 100,000 were planted by hand. A trench was dug in straight rows with a mini plough pulled by a tractor. We then had plants laid out by 1 person down the row with someone following behind planting on their hands and knees up and down the rows. I said to my father that we should buy a small feed planter machine. As this only required one person on the tractor and another sitting on the planter loading the plants onto fingers that took the plants into the soil. Less labour. No tired staff. JOB DONE. But my father would not go ahead with the modern planter but continued planting by hand for several more years.

As you may all realise phebalium has now been replaced by Buxus, Griselinia etc





Rose growing which took two years to grow before

harvesting also took a lot of work in the old days. We never used polythene to plant our rose root stock cuttings, they went straight into the soil. Weeds were a big problem. We would be hand hoeing down each side of these plants pulling weeds out amongst the plants and it would take about seven people four months of the year to do this

job. We are now using polythene and have never used a hand hoe since. This is easier on staff and tidier paddocks

I now only grow about 40,000 roses, have 3 staff, more machinery and a small number of fruit tree, hedges and citrus

30 years ago, big rose plant producers and breeder overseas were growing one million plants per grower and are now only growing less them one hundred thousand each

The moral of the story is there is less gardening and more socialising. We are a busy nation so don't have time for gardening

NEWS FROM YOUR WAIKATO DISTRICT COUNCILLOR



As I write this article it is another lovely autumn day. However, speaking as a farmer, we need rain; on the flip side the drier weather has slowed down the growth of my lawn which is a good thing!!

You should have received the Long Term Plan (LTP) 2018-28 consultation document (which includes a submission form) in your mailbox during the last week. It was mailed to each householder, not part of the 'junk mail'. We are holding information sessions about the LTP - the Eureka Ward session will be held at Matangi Hall on Wednesday 4th April, 6:30 - 8pm. Hope to see you there.

Waikato District has given formal feedback on our preferred funding option for the Waikato Regional Theatre (replacing the Founders Theatre). The Regional Council's preferred option states that of their proposed \$5m contribution towards capital costs, \$4.5m would come from the three primary beneficiaries outside Hamilton—Waikato, Waipa and Matamata Piako Districts with the remaining \$0.5m coming from the wider region. Waikato Regional Council (WRC) have outlined a summary of the options in their Long-Term Plan which is now open for consultation. If you would like to make a submission about the theatre funding, details can be found on the WRC website. The public consultation period will be open from 16 March and close on 16 April.

The Eureka Express Committee has joined other groups in the Waikato district to create poppies to commemorate ANZAC Day. Knitting and crochet needles in homes in Eureka (including mine) are busy as poppies are created for a display planned for Eureka.

The idea to knit poppies began as a small project in Australia and has grown from there. The Waikato District initiative began last year when our *Placemaking* Team joined with local community houses to knit or crochet poppies to cover the trunk of at least one tree in town centres for the month of April. This year the project has grown with Council buying enough wool for the first 3,000 poppies and volunteers donating the rest. All the trees will be decorated by Tuesday 18th April and the Eureka group hope to put up their poppies at the Eureka Hall, near the Cenotaph, on or about 9th April. There is also a project to create a 1,200 poppy trail down the Te Awa Cycle Way.

Matangi Village joined the project last year with a tree installation in the Jack Foster Reserve and and will be erecting their display again this year with the addition of more poppies being provided by their community. The Matangi Community Committee has also applied to the Heritage Fund for funds to go towards installing a World War 1 Roll of Honour to join the WW2 Roll of Honour in the Hall.

In Tauwhare, the Tauwhare Community Committee and residents are working with Council to combine an iconic sculpture with the development of a picnic/resting area. This week I met with the Community Committee, Council staff and local Iwi to discuss the final design for the sculpture. It was agreed to obtain the resource consent, so the project can proceed.

Every country is grappling with the problem of plastic waste. There is an excellent article in the February issue of the Waikato District Council Publication *Link* (see at www.waikatodistrict.govt.nz) which outlines what this could mean for NZ. All our plastics go offshore for processing - China has changed its regulations about receiving waste from other countries and this could have a huge impact on our recycling systems. So, we have to be smarter with our use of plastics. The article featured these helpful hints.

- 1. Avoid plastic when you can a tough ask, but not impossible. There are plenty of amazing Kiwis that are doing this with no major upheaval to their everyday lives, except the conscious decisions they choose to make. - 2. If you can't avoid it, try to reduce the amount of plastic you have in your life Numbers 1 and 2 are the easiest to be recycled. Try reducing the use of the other numbers that are more challenging.
- 3. Choose clear over coloured plastic clear plastics have more value in the overseas market because they are the most versatile.
- 4. Contamination is an issue ensure the plastic you put out for recycling is washed and only the numbers specified are put out.
- 5. By reducing your use of plastic and making sure recycling is clean, you are supporting local businesses. Two of our refuse and recycling contractors are local, providing local jobs in our communities

It is good to see that NZ supermarkets are moving away from the use of plastic shopping bags and packing meat in recyclable trays. However, we must reduce our dependency on plastic sooner rather than later.
