

Thank you Eureka! What a wonderful welcome my son Luca and I have received since arriving 10 months ago.


Hi, I'm Kim Williamson. Luca and I live on Friedlander Road.

his veggies, especially straight from the garden. Most make it to the kitchen with a bite taken out here and there.




Here they are really distinctive....although winter was just far too long and I've never desired spring so much in all my life. Springtime in the garden in Eureka is just wonderful.





The Hall Committee have been extremely busy this year, and we are still working on two more projects which will take us well into the New Year.



A HUGE PLEA TO THE COMMUNITY

Below is an article from the Waikato District council site. It is interesting to read. This season has been particularly bad for privet, so hay fever an asthma sufferers are having a really bad season. This year has been the worst for me, so I put it out to our community to please check out your land for privet and get rid of it. There is a lot of it around this area, on the road boundaries especially. The trees are all in flower at the moment so are not hard to find. We could make Eureka privet free if we all put in a bit of effort. This effort would be gratefully accepted by the sufferers of asthma and hay fever. We then only have pollens to affect us. Maybe we could make it a community project.

Privet All privet (Ligustrum species) Why it is a pest plant

Privet is an evergreen shrub or tree with at least four species found in New Zealand. These include tree privet (Ligustrum lucidum), Chinese privet (Ligustrum sinense), Californian privet (Ligustrum ovalifolium) and common privet (Ligustram vulgare). Both tree privet and Chinese privet are tolerant of drought, as well as cold and wet conditions.

Privet's leaves and berries are poisonous to animals and people. Its pollen and scent is also believed by some to contribute to respiratory disorders such as asthma and hay fever. However, because research shows privet is not a strong allergen for most people, a positive allergy test is needed before the regional council can require a privet tree to be removed on health grounds.

Privet is also an environmental pest, rapidly invading bush margins and waste areas. Tree privet is capable of crowding out canopy trees in native forests, may impede native seedling germination and can eventually dominate an area of forest. Chinese privet can displace shrubs on the margins of native forests.

Privet is widespread and common in the Waikato region.

Identifying features – Chinese Privet

Flower

Small white flowers that are strongly scented and appear from September to December.

Fruit/seed

Dark purple-black berries.

Seeds spread by birds.

Leaf

Leaves are small and dull green with wavy edges.

Responsibility for control

Landowners/occupiers in the Waikato must destroy privet on their land if they receive a pest plant notice from Waikato Regional Council (issued when the council receives a positive allergy test for privet from a neighbour), or live in a community initiative area.

The privet causing the problem must be within 50m of the property boundary or within a public amenity area like a park, reserve, playground or walking track.

Privet is also banned from being sold, propagated, distributed or included in commercial displays.

Community initiatives

A 'total control' rule for privet applies within the 'community initiative' areas of Kāwhia, Tuakau, Whatawhata, Ōtorohanga, Te Kūiti, Pirongia, Kihikihi, Orini, Mangatarata, Te Aroha, Waihi and Paeroa. This means all landowners/occupiers in these areas are required to control all privet on their property irrespective of a valid health-related complaint.

How to control privet

Physical control

- Pull out or dig up small plants, being careful to remove the entire root system so it doesn't regrow.
- If you have to cut down a larger plant, you will need to treat the stump with herbicide to stop it from regrowing.
- Desirable plant species such as native shrubs and grass should be established where soil has been disturbed. This will suppress the germination of privet and other weeds.

Herbicide control

Frilling

With a sharp chisel or axe, make a deep cut into the sapwood at regular intervals around the base of the tree. Immediately saturate the cuts with herbicide.

Basal treatment of trunk


This can be done all year round. Apply with a paintbrush or low pressure sprayer using a solid cone nozzle. Liberally treat the full circumference and the basal parts of the shrub or tree trunk in a manner that thoroughly wets at least 2-3 times the diameter of the lower stem or trunk, including the root collar area.

Cut stump treatment

This can be done all year round. Cut the tree down, leaving a stump no higher than 5cm above ground level. Immediately paint herbicide over the entire stump surface, including the sides.


Cut and inject

This can be done all year round. Holes are drilled sloping into the sapwood at regular intervals around the tree. Inject herbicide into holes. A drench gun or similar can be used.

PUKEKO


We have so much to be thankful for this year and we thank you for all your support along the way!




Gingerbread House

We construct this every year on Christmas Eve and the kids know it comes out after Christmas Lunch to dismantle & find the 'surprises' hidden inside the house.... and to then feast on over the holidays. It keeps fresh for weeks if it's kept in an airtight container..

- 1 cup of butter
- 1 cup of Sugar
- 1 cup of golden syrup

Bring the above ingredients to boil on the stove - once boiled take it off the heat and add 1tsp of baking soda &



a little bit of cinnamon. Then add enough flour (approximately 3 cups) to make dough that holds its shape. Roll out the dough on baking paper when at the right thickness - (not too thin as it burns and can crack) place the dough on a lightly greased & floured oven tray. Now place the pre-cut pattern over the dough and cut it out. (You can make your own design for the pattern - or find one on the Net)

If you want to make stained glass windows cut out the window shapes – spray a little baking spray in the hole and put crushed boiled sweets into the window shape.

Bake for approximately 7-10 minutes at 350 degrees - then as soon as it is out of the oven place your pattern over it again and re-cut it if required - to ensure the sides are straight.

Royal Icing (cement!!)

Place one egg white in a bowl and whisk well – then add icing sugar slowly. When it becomes stiff, add a squirt of lemon juice and whisk again. Then keep adding icing sugar until it gets stiff again and holds its shape.

Put the icing in a piping bag and pipe it between the edges of the house to use as the cement to hold the house together.

(This gingerbread recipe was used in the 2nd World War by my Grandmother. My mum could remember as a little girl, baking the gingerbread biscuits and putting them in recycled Golden Syrup tins with the addresses scratched off. They would then wrap them up securely with socks, her Mum and Aunties had also knitted, to post off to the soldiers and prisoners of war)





How to upgrade to Windows 10 with a Windows 7 license

As I've stated in previous articles, Microsoft discontinues support for Windows 7 in January 2020, meaning that it will be unsafe to use on the internet due to a lack of security updates. It's unfortunate as, like myself, many prefer Windows 7 to Windows 8 or 10, but there are worse problems to have in the world at present. At this point you've got two choices if you're on Windows 7: upgrade your computer to Windows 10 or, buy a new computer with Windows 10 on it. Alternatively you could crossgrade to Linux or Mac, but that's beyond the scope of the article.

The second option, buying a new computer, is something any computer enthusiast can probably advise you on. The first is something you can still do without purchasing a separate Windows 10 license, with the right knowhow and technical ability. The knowhow is something I can bestow upon you, the technical ability I can't. If you or someone you know isn't capable of doing this, please talk to myself or any other seasoned computer technician about upgrading — otherwise you leave the window open for the more nefarious types to exploit your computer once it stops being protected in late January. But here's how it works, for those interested.

Long ago in the age before time – also known as 2016 – Microsoft 'officially' closed the free upgrade offer from Windows 7 to Windows 10. However they still allow you to upgrade to Windows 10 and receive a valid Windows 10 license so long as you have a valid Windows 7 or 8 license. You have to do a 'clean' install ie. wipe your computer, install windows 10 and copy everything back on, including reinstalling your programs, but for 99% of computers this works fine and you get a valid Windows 10 license as a result. The other 1% tend to be name-brand machines eg. HP, with custom Windows 7 licenses.

If you choose to do this it pays to take a few precautions first. For starters, you're going to want to make a clone of your hard drive, so that if the upgrade doesn't work for some reason, you can put the original installation back on. I recommend Macrium Reflect to do so, but you'll also need another computer and a larger hard drive than the one you're cloning. You'll also need to take the original hard drive out of your computer and put it in the other computer in order to do so. Alternatively you could take the original hard drive out, and not back it up but instead replace it with a faster SSD drive to install Windows 10 onto.

The second step is to install Windows 10: you'll need a spare flash drive of at least 8GB size to put the installer onto. To do so, download and run the Microsoft "Windows 10 installation media tool" (google it). It's roughly a 4GB download. I recommend a 64-bit installation unless your original Windows 7 installation was 32-bit. Then, once you've got the Windows 10 installer on your flash drive, boot the original computer from the flash drive. You may have to press a key such as ESC, F8, F10 or F12 when your computer starts up in order to do so. Once booted the installation procedure should be pretty straightforward; and when it asks for your license key, enter your Windows 7 key and you're (typically) good to go.

Lastly, you'll need to copy your data back on – this is where the backup of your original installation comes in handy. Using Macrium reflect (or whatever other hard drive backup software you've used), navigate to c:\Users\(your username) and copy your Documents, Pictures, etc folders to an external drive, then copy from that external drive to the new computer. Lastly, reinstall whatever programs you were using on the old computer. Once done I recommend hanging onto the old installation backup for at least a couple of months in case you've missed something.

Waikato region urged to conserve water ahead of hot summer



04 December 2019

Summer is officially here so it's time to start thinking about how much water we use. While we aren't at water alert levels yet, it's not far away if we keep using the amount we are.

Hamilton City Council's City Waters Manager Maire Porter said despite the rain we've experienced in recent weeks, it's important to conserve water now as we prepare for the long, dry summer ahead. "We have already seen a steady increase in water demand over the past month. Historical trends indicate that with improving weather, water use will only continue to increase throughout December."

Acting General Manager Service Delivery Roger MacCulloch says warmer weather always leads to an increase in water consumption in the Waikato district. "Everyone has been doing well so far and as we move towards summer, we need to remember to keep on top of our water usage. It has generally been a hot and dry year so far, so the community can play their part by using water wisely ahead of what could be a long, dry summer. There are lots of ways to conserve water, taking shorter showers, watering the garden by hand, or washing your car on a piece of lawn which needs watering can save hundreds of litres a day."

Waipa District Council's Water Services Manager, Martin Mould, said a hot summer is on the cards but a wet spring season is keeping water alert levels at bay for the first time since the Smart Water campaign started.

"Te Awamutu and Pirongia's water supply comes from the Mangauika Stream. In the summer months, it can struggle to keep up with demand, so we are advising people be mindful of how they use water, particularly over summer.

"Warmer weather and periods of heavy rainfall from recent thunderstorms are contributing well to the stream's levels, however increased water temperatures may cause algal blooms which can also initiate a water alert level. The higher we can keep the stream level, the more freshwater is able to flow and reduce the occurrence of algae growth."

"Waipā is in for a long, hot summer and we all need to consider how much water we are using."

NEWS FROM YOUR WAIKATO DISTRICT COUNCILLOR - 3rd DECEMBER 2019

On Saturday 16th November Jill and I attended the **Pukeko Preschool Open Day** when their new building was officially opened.



Congratulations to the past and present committee members, parents, staff and supporters for building this wonderful facility – a real asset to the Tauwhare community and families in surrounding districts.

Councillors were sworn in at a ceremony on 30th October. There was a full house on the day with many friends and family there to support the new and re-elected Councillors. We have since been very busy attending training and induction sessions; our Standing Committee meetings begin in December and we will then take a break until late January with a very busy calendar already in place for next year.

For this term of Council, I will be a member of all Standing Committees, the Heritage Assessment Team, various Funding Committees, Chair of the Creative Community Committee and will represent Council on the Hauraki Gulf Forum.

I have in previous terms represented Council on the Waikato Regional Council (WRC) Central Catchment Committee. However, the new Regional Council has recently announced that they have overhauled their committee structure and WRC's twelve Drainage and Catchment Committees have gone. These have been replaced with three new committees – Freshwater Actions, Infrastructure and Special Projects and Climate Action. These committees better fit the new era of environmental objectives and priorities, however disestablishing the Drainage and Catchment Committees, whose members included representatives from local communities, could mean the loss of decades of local knowledge. I hope the Regional Council will continue to consult local communities and create a conduit for local input to drainage and catchment issues. Sue Edmonds from Eureka has been a community representative on the Central Catchment Committee, was a very active member of the committee and has made an outstanding contribution – thank you Sue.

Horsham Downs Road has been closed for more than a year for bridge construction over the **Waikato Expressway**. The new bridge will be blessed, and Horsham Downs Road reopened on 19 December 2019. This is the last local road bridge to be completed on the project.

The Huntly section of the Expressway is expected to open on 14th February 2020. I recently had an opportunity to travel over this section with some of the CityEdge staff and see this complex project first-hand. The section is a 15.2km four-lane expressway linking the Ohinewai and Taupiri sections – it is built to the east of Huntly, around the back of Taupiri Mountain. It has involved 3.5million ²m of earthworks, including a 60-metre-deep pass through the Taupiri Range. It also includes over 100ha of forest, bush and wetland enhancement and the permanent protection of a sacred lagoon and two paa. In 2015 the project won three major awards for excellent in planning, engineering and resource management.

Council now produces a **quarterly e-newsletter** from Council's Consents and Building Quality Departments. This has been established to keep our residents informed about important information regarding building and resource consents in the Waikato District. You can go online to https://www.waikatodistrict.govt.nz/services-facilities/land-and-property/growing-places-newsletter to subscribe to this newsletter.

This quarter's newsletter is very informative and includes information on building code changes, the statutory closedown period for building and resource consents, LIMs and Development Contribution considerations (20 Dec -10 January), submitting a building consent electronically, Building Code changes and Common Further Information Requests on Building Consent applications – i.e. the main reasons Council have to request further information from applicants that can slow down the process.

All Waikato District Council offices close at 3pm on 24 December and will reopen on 6 January. However, you can report any non-urgent matters online during this period or, if you want to report any road damage or other urgent matters, you can phone Council on 0800 492 452.

I am available via email or mobile during the holiday period.

I hope you have an enjoyable holiday season with your family and friends – drive safely and take care in the water.
