


May 2019 be a happy year for all we residents of Eureka.





On 17th December long-established Platt Road identity, John Williams passed away. John and Charlotte arrived in 1966 and there raised their family of four, Ritchie, Alison, Linda and Gavin. Respected carpenter, builder and joiner, John was also a passionate gardener as their large and beautiful section testifies. Trips back to visit family in Scotland, and daughters, Alison (US), and Linda and family (UK), were a highlight for John and Charlotte into their retirement years. Aged almost 84 years John is sadly missed.



On January 3rd our dearly loved Eureka Pioneer, Joe Stockman, passed away in Whangamata, aged 86 years. Joe emigrated to NZ from Holland when he was 18 years old, having trained as a mechanic. He met and married Noeline and they were living in Auckland when Joe heard about land available in Eureka. As he'd always wanted to open his own business Joe purchased an acre of land from Lester Masters and the petrol pump licence from the Campbell's General Store next door. He built a workshop, tidied up the surroundings and opened Eureka Motors in January 1961. Within two years Joe and Noeline had built a new house on the section and there they raised a family of three, Anton, Karen and Mark.

In late 1971 Noeline bought the store and PO from Margaret and Stuart Willetts and kept it running for two years until it was sold to Maurice and Kay Langdon. Meantime Joe was training Colin Duncan as an award winning apprentice, and in 1977 Colin took over Eureka Motors and still owns it today. Joe and Noeline stayed in Eureka when they sold the garage having built a house on a 10 acre block on Eureka Road (now owned by Philip and Joelean Mayall). Joe and Noeline played a very active role in the Eureka community through the school and hall during their 25 years here, Joe being one of the first committee of seven who built the new hall which opened in 1969.

Joe's many friends and associates mourn the loss of a loved and treasured friend and deepest sympathy is extended to Noeline and all the family.


Remember the little library is there for us all to use. It is so convenient to get a new book, especially if you need one in the weekend. Just remember do a swap.

















Room 4 iMovies requested by Apple








Pukeko Country Preschool




- To enable someone to be stronger and more confident, especially in controlling their choices and decisions.

- It's about how students and teachers approach learning. They are motivated, confident, and ready to tackle the task.





TASTE BUDS

OVERGROWN ZUCCHINIS

Blanch zucchini whole for 3 or 4 minutes in boiling water. Remove and cool. Slice in half lengthwise and scoop out seeds.

250g cream cheese 5 tbs sour cream 1 tbs garlic 1/2 cup Panko breadcrumbs Lemon pepper to taste 180g grated cheddar cheese 1-2 tbs Jalapeños Pinch of salt ½ cup grated coconut 1 red pepper cut up

Method:

Soften cream cheese in microwave, mash up and add sour cream, ½ the cheddar cheese, garlic, Jalapeños, red pepper, salt and lemon pepper. Stuff the zucchini boats. Sprinkle the panko breadcrumbs and coconut on top along with the remainder of the cheddar cheese. Bake 400 degrees for 15-20 mins. Sprinkle some parsley on top Enjoy.



TUNA AND SWEETCORN PATTIES

185g can of tuna 2 tsp curry powder 2 tbsp tomato sauce 2 eggs 1 cup whole kernel sweetcorn 2 cups breadcrumbs 1/4 cup flour 1/4 cup oil

Method:

Flake tuna (tuna in oil) into a bowl, add curry powder, tomato sauce, 1 egg, corn and 1 cup of breadcrumbs. Combine well. Form mixture into five patties.

Lightly whisk remaining egg and pour into a shallow bowls. Dust patties with flour and then coat with egg and the remaining breadcrumbs.



Heat a little oil in a frying pan and cook patties in batches, turning until golden on both sides.




CHOCOLATE ZUCCHINI CAKE

2 cups (250g) plain flour 375g caster sugar 350ml vegetable oil 90g chopped walnuts 65g cocoa powder ½ teaspoon salt 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon4 eggs340g grated zucchini2 teaspoons bicarb soda1 teaspoon baking powder



Preheat oven to 180 degrees C. Grease and flour a 20 x 30cm baking tin.



In a medium bowl, stir together the flour, sugar, cocoa, bicarb, baking powder, salt and cinnamon. Add the eggs and oil, mix well. Fold in the nuts and zucchini until they are evenly distributed. Pour into the prepared tin.

Bake for 50 to 60 minutes in the preheated oven until a knife inserted into the centre comes out clean. Cool cake completely before icing with your favourite icing.



IN MY GARDEN

The first two months have had a dramatic change in the weather, rain December and January. Maize crops responded with good vigorous growth. Surplus grass made into silage. As one drives around the country you see piles of silage stacked up and plenty of maize planted and looking good. My first thought was will all this surplus feed be needed. Yes the drought hit and lots of farms and lifestyle blocks have become very dry, including maize crops.

This is one of the longest and hottest Februarys in many years with record temperatures and drying winds and yes, as we now know, this supply of silage and maize will be much appreciated by all farmers. In the horticulture sector large amounts of water has been required to help keep crops alive and growing.


People ask me when do I prune my fruit trees, roses, hedge plants etc. Providing the plants you are pruning are not in flower or fruiting you can summer prune anytime to control growth to any height for harvesting fruit on fruit trees. Hedging should be cut once a year to keep plants tidy and prevent gaps appearing under the hedge plants. Always prune to the lowest growing hedge branch for the best results. Weeds are a major problem in preventing healthy growth in all types of plant you may be growing. A good preventer of weed growth is spreading compost under your plants or hedge. Every 3 months apply a liberal amount of compost around your plants.

Remember to order your winter plant requirements at Roachs. We can source plants you require that we may not grow. We supply mushroom compost that is weed and bark free and can be spread around any plants you have in your garden.

It seems, year to year, that we have not less, but more compromised businesses, facebook scandals and data hacks. There's a few mitigating factors; rising crime online as old-school mafia and gangs gradually acquaint themselves with new ways of defrauding people. A rise in india, china, pakistan, russia and mongolia of scam-based enterprises (those phone calls you get 'about your computer'). And of course theres the proliferation of the internet in almost every aspect of our daily lives, from banking to satnay equipment.

But the main reason is complexity. Societies become more complex as they grow, in order to more effectively manage larger territory and the more varied scenarios that come with that territory. Similarly as software grows it has to accommodate new variations of usage, new scenarios; and the more scenarios it is used in, the more complex it becomes. Theoretically, with software it should be a lot easier to restructure back down into a simpler model once it becomes too complex, than it is with a society.

But business practices and pragmatism often get in the way of this. Take Microsoft for example; their internal motto used to be "extend, embrace, extinguish", a code for working with companies making technology that got in the way of their business interests. Specifically, their interest in making everybody use Microsoft technology! Their current business practices still reflect this ethic. One of the ways they achieve this is by supplying proprietary software frameworks that programmers must use in order to build software for Windows.

This makes it tricky for programmers to develop software for multiple operating systems. And the downside of this market-rigging is that the Windows is awash in old obselete technologies that they initially developed in order to screen out competitors, but then had to support in all their future operating systems going forward so that old software would run. That means there's more complexity, and more places a hacker might get in.

The same principle applies to web browsers, which have had to support a myriad of different technologies as the internet has developed over the past 30 years, and now are vast, unwieldy beasts which have to be updated every week to prevent something breaking or to patch some security hole. At some point one has to say, "enough's enough", retire old technologies and risk breaking a few things. Otherwise our computers just get slower.

So what's the takeaway from this for you, as the consumer? Well, basically software developers like to tell you "this software is 'better' because it's newer and supports X, Y and Z", but in reality it's also inherently more insecure. Because they expanded their territory, increased their complexity and created more opportunity for bugs and security holes to arise. So, wherever possible avoid excessive software which tries to cover all bases, like Outlook or Adobe PDF viewer, because in doing so they leave themselves open to a greater number of security exploits and require constant patching as a result.

Instead, try to go for more lightweight, stable and focussed pieces of software which only do one or two things but do them well. A few good examples: Mozilla Thunderbird (email client), Sumatra PDF viewer, Foxit PDF viewer. Large software companies will tend to make larger, more complex software as they have greater numbers of users to cater for. Smaller companies will tend to make smaller and more focussed software. In general, only applaud a developer when they make their product smaller or better, not bigger and newer.

NEWS FROM YOUR WAIKATO DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

I would like to wish you all a **Happy New Year**. The summer holidays and relaxing at the beach are now a distant memory. We have a bumper fruit crop this year being enjoyed by extended family (and our sheep, and the bird and possum population!).

As you are all aware the dry weather is starting to bite, and I hope those of you who are farming can keep milking until the rains come, which hopefully isn't too far away. As I write this newsletter, we are all sweltering in 30+ degree heat so it is a good time to remind you to check your water pipes for leaks. For those of you connected to the Southern Districts Water Scheme; I have just had a first-hand experiencer of how water leaks can go undetected. My eldest son noted that there was no water coming into our tank. After some hours of searching we discovered a pipe hidden under long grass on our boundary had disconnected near our water meter and the water meter was also leaking. Soon fixed and fortunately didn't happen while we were on holiday.

I still don't have a firm date for the start of the Seddon Road repairs; I have been told early March, so I hope this isn't pushed back again. I am working with Alliance to spray the road/rail reserve along Holland Road where required.

If your family or friends host overseas visitors or are Airbnb hosts; Hamilton & Waikato Tourism (Hamiltonwaikato.com) have recently put out a new, very comprehensive *Official Regional Visitors Guide 2019*. Containing an easy to follow Waikato map, events calendar, regional cycle trails, what to do, where to eat etc in all the Waikato towns and surrounds it is an excellent 'one place' guide for visitors. I suggest you email **info@hamiltonwaikato.com** to ask where to source copies.

Council has been meeting again since early February with our monthly round of committee meetings and briefings on various matters including the Hamilton to Auckland **rail corridor**. The rail service plans are progressing with a Transport Connections Working Party overseeing the delivery of a business case. A proposed project governance structure and terms of reference are now ready for approval. WDC Council will appoint a representative to the proposed Governance Working Group along with the other Councils involved and Auckland Transport, MOT, NZTA and KiwiRail. The start of a service is anticipated for mid-2020.

The Waikato District Heritage Forum met recently at the Mercer Museum; Mercer was the home of the Roose family who were instrumental in developing the Waikato River as a sand dredging business and a thriving river based commercial shipping enterprise ferrying goods and passengers by river from Auckland to Port Waikato. It was very interesting to learn how the river was used and how this family made a huge impact on the development of the Waikato we know today. In 1986 Margaret Stuart, then resident in Matangi, wrote a history of the family and their businesses and community enterprises, *Grand Old Man of the River – Caesar Roose* in collaboration with Jeanette Thomas (nee Roose). It is a fascinating book – I have a copy that will be made available through the Eureka/Tamahere Heritage Committee archives.

There is a rail project being developed in Mercer that will use steam trains and carriages imported from England. Whilst mentioning steam trains – don't forget the *Glen Afton Heritage Railway*, 12km west of Huntly, that runs 10am - 3pm on the first Sunday of every month – you can take a picnic lunch and there is a café on site. I represent Waikato District on the **Hauraki Gulf Forum**. Made up of Councillor and technical staff representatives from all the Councils that border the Gulf, local Iwi, Gulf Islands Community Boards, DOC etc the Forum meets quarterly at the Auckland Town Hall. Our recent meeting was attended by two Ministers of the Crown – Ministers Sage and Mahuta who discussed with us Marine Reserves to further protect the fish and shellfish stocks and other conservation measures.

On 1st July last year Fire & Emergency NZ took over responsibility from Council for dealing with fire permits and fire related issues. On 4 February Fire and Emergency NZ announced that a **restricted fire season** would start. This means a fire permit is required to light any fire in the open-air Exemptions are barbecues, traditional cooking fires, braziers and outdoor gas heaters. However, it is the responsibility of the person lighting the fire to ensure there are sufficient resources on site to manage the fire and that the fire is contained at all times. The person lighting a fire should have public liability and fire suppression insurance because if a fire gets out of control the person lighting the fire is liable for all the costs for damage and fire suppression.
