


# Tauwhare School

Creating collaborative platforms to enhance teacher capability.






#### KidsCan Crazy Dress Up Day






### SCHOOL BUS SAFETY


#### School bus signs

The signs below will be displayed on school buses. If a school bus has stopped you must slow down and drive at 20km/h or less until you are well past (no matter which direction you are coming from) if:

- the bus displays a school bus sign on which the lights are flashing, or
- the bus displays a school bus sign (with or without flashing lights) and has stopped for the purpose of picking up or dropping off school children.








Note: you may also see 'Kura', the Māori word for school, on a bus. Police will strictly enforce a 4km/h tolerance of the posted speed limit outside schools, kindergartens and play centres during high-use times. This will apply within 250 metres of the boundaries on each side of the school.

#### School zones

Some schools display signs that are turned on before and after school and other times such as lunchtime:



This sign will be displayed at the start of the school zone. If the 40 is visible and the yellow lights are flashing, the maximum speed is 40km/h until the zone ends.




# TASTE BUDS GREEN CURRY SALMON CAKES

500g potatoes, peeled and chopped.

2tbs (400g) green curry paste

½ cup coarsely chopped coriander

415g can pink salmon, drained and flaked



Boil potatoes until tender, drain and mash. Add remaining ingredients, season with salt and pepper. Shape into patties and cook approx. 4 mins each side.


Serves 4-6 people.

#### CARROT AND GINGER SOUP

2 spring onions, sliced1 tbs freshly grated ginger12 medium carrots, peeled and sliced1ltr veg or chicken stock

Sauté the spring onions and ginger for about 5 mins, add the carrots and sauté a few more mins. Add the stock and bring to the boil. Turn down to low and simmer for 30 mins till carrots are tender. Puree till smooth. Season with salt and pepper, cumin and lemon juice to taste.

A twist for this soup is to OR add a cup of orange juice and only 3 cups of stock. Yummy



# Why you shouldn't advertise online (with non-local giant faceless corporations)

There's a lot of problems with the internet. One of those problems is how difficult it is to advertise online. So much of the web is funded by advertising that it's hard to get away from it — unless you install an ad-blocker. So you might think, well I'll take advantage of that in my business, but unfortunately it's not overly simple. Unlike a regular newspaper or billboard, where you put the ad up and then you're done, online advertising is much more complicated. First you've got to choose where to put your money. Is it google ads? Bing ads? Facebook (or even spotify) ads?

Now that you've chosen a platform, you have to reconcile yourself to the fact that if anything goes wrong with your advertising, there is no recompense. You're dealing with large, multinational corporations that don't particularly care whether you live or die. I had one incident where an advertisement I displayed on facebook did not match what they showed in their ad manager; this led to many people accusing the ad of being a hoax due to the missing text. Several complaints later, facebook's indian support center led me on, lied constantly, but never did anything or refunded.

As I learned, in social media each advertisement you make is basically a giant billboard that anyone can graffiti. Everyone can post a comment, and that comment gets viewed by the other people who see the ad. This can work out well if you have an established brand presence on facebook and the people commenting are your supporters. But - as I found out the hard way - you can also become a target for an angry mob in a way that isn't possible with traditional advertising.

In addition, my experience of advertising on Google Ads and Bing Ads has been pretty fruitless. It is possible to do well, and there are folks who do it for a living, but it is quite a fine art. Those people actually adjust ads on the fly, comparing the metrics of the different variants of ads they've put out and pushing ones which perform well, with more money. It takes effort and understanding to do, and unless you're committed to it, it may be a waste of time and money.

For facebook and other social media sites you are probably better off growing an audience organically, rather than paying for advertising, and that also takes time, patience and effort. Maybe not so much effort if you're an extrovert and you like talking with random strangers (there's nothing wrong with that!), but most aren't wired that way, and so it can seem like an exercise in futility. If you're so inclined you could hire someone whose job is to do this. That way, you can focus on getting work the done while someone else does the talking, like a personal digital secretary.

It has become apparent over the years that facebook intentionally lied about it's advertising, inflating the metrics of it's advertising views by up to 900% in some cases — the result has been several class action lawsuits. I've observed that they also have a bank of what look like fake users that they show ads to. Regardless, if you want to use their services it pays to hire someone who specialises in online advertising to see through all the smoke and mirrors.

Overall what I recommend is word of mouth and organic growth when it comes to online marketing. It depends on your business of course, but often non-local online advertising is throwing money down a hole unless someone is advising you. The younger generation increasingly don't read newspapers or local flyers, but they're also leaving facebook in droves, so mostly you're reaching Gen X'ers. Advertising online is one hell of a job, and you have to decide whether it's a job you want to be doing.

#### Antivirus companies to Avoid

The things we do! The other day I was on the phone to Norton (also known as Symantec), an antivirus company, for a full 50 minutes. Every step of the way they tested our patience; they checked things that had already been checked, did things that didn't need to be done. They were – of course – running out of some call center in India for maybe 50c an hour, so I used my limited compassion and let them waste both my and the clients time. But enough's enough. When you get to 50 minutes of wasted time and they still won't admit they've got a problem or give a refund, it's time to choose another antivirus company.

Norton has always had problems; when it's not their appalling customer service, or their labyrinthine uninstall processes, it's the problems they actually cause to machines they're meant to protect. In the mid-2000's, installing their software was considered worse than having a virus. Even in this decade they've been found to actually expose systems to increased risk by using outdated programming procedures. They're probably the number 1 company I tell people to avoid when they ask about antivirus software. There are others though.

There is a peculiar antivirus package floating around the net that I sometimes see on client's machines called "360 Total Security". Not to be confused with Norton 360, a product from the late 2000's, this appears to be a semi-legitimate antivirus package made in China. However, and this is where it gets odd, there have been reports of it sending information from users machines back to a server in china. This may be harmless, but like Huawei, could be part of a larger China government data-mining project. They have also been found guilty of providing fake products to antivirus comparison agencies, in order to get better ratings and make more sales.

Staying with China, there's also a well-meaning but flawed product called "Panda Antivirus". The main problem with Panda is that it has a habit of creating too many 'false positives', that is, detecting things as viruses which aren't actually viruses. In 2016 it incorrectly detected core system files on many windows computers as viruses and removed them, resulting in thousands of computers being unable to boot up or access the internet.

Back on the western front, Trend Micro is another one I often recommend avoiding, for two reasons; poor programming and performance issues. It tends to be one of the slower antivirus packages – all antivirus packages slow down your system to an extent, but some are worse than others. But it's also guilty of some worrying security flaws: in 2016 it was found to contain code which would allow a hacker to silently steal any of the end user's passwords and usernames.

So enough whining, who do I recommend? Well, you've got several options. The best one, in my view, is probably Eset and their paid antivirus solutions. The company has an actual office in Auckland, so you can talk to real tech support people who aren't getting paid peanuts and will try and help you. More to the point though, they have the best antivirus packages in terms of performance and security. If you currently have a paid subscription to another antivirus product, talk to them; they should be able to give you a 'crossgrade' discount.

Also of note is "Avast". While it may sound somewhat scurvy, Avast is a legitimate, reputable antivirus company with both paid and free products, and it does extremely well in both detection and performance categories. The free version will of course bug you to upgrade to a larger product, but there's little advantage to doing it (so just ignore the ads). AVG, another antivirus product which used to be it's own company, is actually owned by Avast now. So you'll get the same protection from both, but I've personally found AVG's interface to be a little less reliable and workable.

Lastly, there's the built-in antivirus that comes standard with Windows 10, also known as 'Defender'. It is better than nothing, doesn't cost a cent and won't bug you to upgrade to anything, but it's worth noting that it consistently performs worse in it's detection statistics than the paid solutions. It is fine for lightweight computer use and internet browsing, though if you're going further afield on the net, you may need something sturdier. I hope all this helps your purchasing decisions. Then perhaps the hours I've spent trying not to swear at customer service reps for large antivirus corporations will not have been in vain.

#### **NEWS FROM YOUR WAIKATO DISTRICT COUNCILLOR – 25 AUGUST 2019**

Finally, a welcome break from the wet weather – a fine weekend at last; time to cut the lawn.



A lot has been happening in the Waikato District during the last month including: -

A \$92m funding announcement for the start-up 150-passenger rail service between Hamilton and Auckland – the culmination of an 18-month collaboration between multiple councils and government agencies.

Following on from the rail funding announcement, **NZ Transport Agency Board committed funding to implement the infrastructure** needed to roll out the rail service in June 2020. This means Waikato District Council can now begin upgrading the Huntly Railway Station. Huntly township will be bypassed when the Huntly Section of the Expressway is opened in 2020, so this project is well-timed to create

work and future opportunities for Huntly.

A contract between Waikato District Council (WDC) and Watercare Services Ltd to deliver safe drinking water, wastewater and stormwater services to Waikato district from 1st October has been completed.

The completion of the Hamilton Section of the *Expressway* is now scheduled for late 2021. On SH1 Tamahere, motorists have now been diverted onto new lanes under the East-West Link Bridge onto what will eventually be the Tamahere off ramp while work begins on constructing or reconstructing routes and links for the Expressway including shared paths for cyclists and walkers. In Eureka Ward, work is beginning on Powells Road, compacting embankments and removing peat from the road where a concrete underpass (a box culvert 5m high x 10m wide) will, in about 3-4 months, be constructed to allow the Expressway to cross over the road. The Powells Rd underpass will be the 17<sup>th</sup> and final bridge structure on the Hamilton Section.
