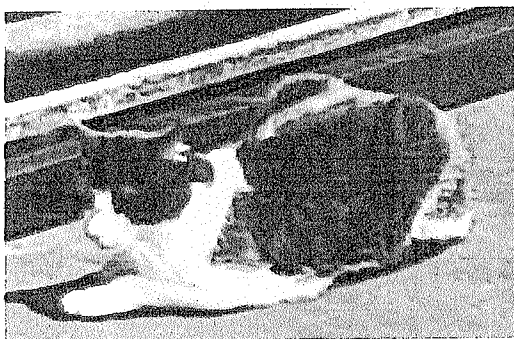

TAMAHERE-WOODLANDS COUNCILLORS' UPDATE

Tamahere-Woodlands Councillors' update December 2022: Looking to the future for local government

A new Sustainability and Wellbeing Committee has just been added to the Waikato District Council committee structure.

It will become one of the Council's main committees alongside the Policy & Regulatory, Strategy & Performance (formerly Strategy & Finance) and Infrastructure committees which all councillors attend.

The new committee will handle decisions on Council work that specifically relates to sustainability and community wellbeing and it's expected to apply a 'wellbeing lens' on how the Council delivers its Long Term Plan work programmes. For example, it's expected to oversee progress on our climate action plan, as well as economic development, social development and cultural strategies and programmes. Emergency management in the district is also expected to sit with this committee, as is the distribution of grant funding.

This move, together with the Council's decision to introduce Maaori wards at this year's election, will start to align the Council with the direction of local government reform as outlined in the Government's 'Review into the Future for Local Government'. Released a month ago, this review is out for public consultation until 28 February.

The Review sets its sights on making local government 'fit' to meet a host of challenges from climate change to growing social and economic inequity. It calls for change to maximise community wellbeing and strengthen local democratic decision making, including Maaori representation and participation. The Review recognises that the Three Waters and Resource Management reforms – which seek to regionalise infrastructure and spatial planning - will impact a significant proportion of what local authorities do, and it argues for the need to reallocate local and central government roles so councils play a greater role in community wellbeing. It also recognises that the current funding arrangements for local government are unsustainable and recommends new funding streams be established, alongside a simplified rating system, to include more co-investment by central Government.

The importance of community, and local participation in decision-making, will not be new to those of you who take an interest in local organisations and initiatives that support a rich and vibrant community life.

So Mike Keir and I, Crystal Beavis, want to thank those of you who have stood, or intend to stand, for election to your local community and hall committees. You play a fundamental part in our local democracy and in the operation of local assets, ensuring that local aspirations are articulated and heard by the Council precisely because they are community-led and supported.

With local community committees and/or hall committees operating in all our communities – in Eureka, Newstead, Tauwhare and Puketaha as well as Gordonton, Tamahere and Matangi - the Tamahere-Woodlands Ward is well-placed to benefit from this renewed recognition and emphasis on the importance of local democracy and community wellbeing.

So, it's important that we share with others, especially our young people, our interest in taking responsibility for our neighbourhoods – and the rewards of friendship, mutual support and engagement that arise out of it.

How do we attract this commitment in an age when online 'communities' are rivalling real neighbourhoods? That's a question for all of us to work together to resolve. The future of local democracy, and our kiwi way of life, depends on it.

Meanwhile – just a reminder that the Council is looking for your feedback on the new draft Reserve Management Plan by 12 December. For example, do you agree they should be smoke-free AND vape-free? Where should drones be allowed to operate? How should we name our parks and reserves?

The Council is also looking for your thoughts before we review our Freedom Camping Bylaw next year. Are there areas in which you want to prohibit or restrict freedom camping? Where should people without self-contained vehicles be allowed to camp?

The Council's Christmas holiday hours are now on the website. Council offices will be closed from midday on Friday 23 December until Monday 9 January, and there is a statutory break in processing resource and building consents and providing LIM reports from 20 December until the end of 10 January, but rubbish and recycling continue as normal, animal control officers will be on call, and you can contact the Council with urgent enquiries on 0800 492 452.

With Christmas coming soon, Mike and I would like to take this opportunity to send you our warm wishes for the holiday season.

I do hope you are able to spend some quality time with your loved ones these holidays.

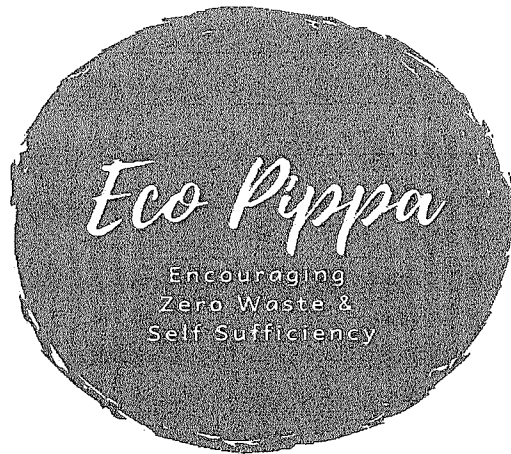
To those of you who have to work through, you have our thanks for all that you do.

TAUWHARE COMMUNITY PLAYGROUP

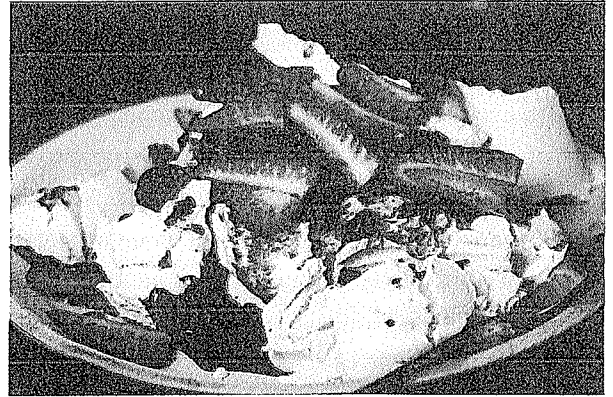

COOKING WITH KAZZA

CHRISTMAS MESS

250 ml cream whipped with $\frac{1}{4}$ cup castor sugar
250 ml greek yoghurt
2 chips strawberries chopped in half
2 chips raspberries
2 tbsp castor sugar
2 tbsp pomegranate syrup
12 to 15 meringues
Slivered almonds to garmish



Carefully mix the beaten cream and yoghurt together.
Place the berries into a bowl and mix with castor sugar and pomegranate syrup.
In a large glass bowl carefully break the meringues and place half in the bottom.
Cover with a layer of cream mixture, then a layer of berries.
Repeat the process finishing with the berries and sprinkle slivered almonds on the top.
Chill at least 2 hours before serving.

EASY WH ITE CHRISTMAS

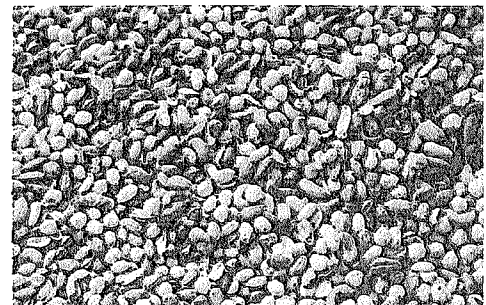
500g white chocolate
1 cup dried cranberries
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup (100g) pistachios unsalted and shelled

Line tin with baking paper. Melt chocolate. Mix in cranberries and pistachios.

Let it come to room temperature before cutting into small pieces.
(Great for Christmas gifts)

 500g salted peanuts
 cashew nuts

You may not want your data in the cloud – but they do

One might notice a trend with cloud storage providers like Dropbox, Google Drive and Onedrive, toward storing files entirely in the cloud and only downloading them to the computer when necessary. This is in some ways useful, particularly in terms of large company-wide file collections, where only a handful of files are really useful for a given computer. However it is also part of a worrying trend toward outside ownership of files. Look at it this way: if all of your files are stored in the cloud, and the cloud provider changes it's terms of service, or you can't pay the bill, or something happens that prevents you from connecting to them - at that point, how do you go about accessing your files? In reality, the cloud provider owns your data and you're paying for access to it.

This is of course the way cloud providers want things to go; if they had it their way, we'd all be running what're known as 'thin clients': bare-minimum computers with low storage capacity, designed to primarily access data online. This would mean that they'd have complete control over our data and how much we pay for access to it. Luckily to date there has been enough push-back from consumers who're not interested in this, that it hasn't manifested that way just yet. But every version of Windows pushes this ownership agenda further; Windows 11 disallows creation of so-called 'local accounts', login accounts which aren't linked to your email address, and which Microsoft can't use to track you and matching usage data against your profile.

You might think you own the rights to privacy of what you do on your computer, but each version of Windows, Apple's iOS and MacOS, and Android, pushes terms and conditions which sign away more rights. Even printer manufacturers are getting in on this act. Most printer software now comes with what is variously called 'customer experience' or 'active improvement' programs where you sign away some rights to the privacy of what you do with your computer or your printer. I've even seen this stuff on Smart TV's. For now, you have the ability to opt-out of these 'features'. In the future you might not, if current trends are any indication.

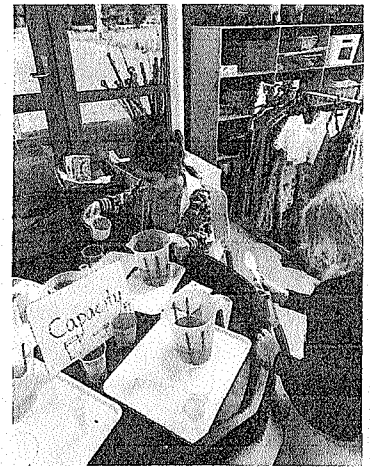
Some of what this 'telemetry' (as it's called) provides, is good – it tells manufacturers how customers are using their products, and in the best case can inform them as to where and how users are getting 'stuck'. But it can also be used to gather information about a user that can be on-sold to third parties. In the world of tomorrow, you may not be the one who calls the shots about your privacy rights - the corporations already have enough sway that people will happily give away their rights in return for ease of use and familiarity. And we are now reaching a tipping point where corps like Microsoft are not even giving an opt-out, which gives them unprecedented access to psychological data that can be used to target you by marketers.

How can you fight back? Well, sending a friendly message to the body corporates that you're uncomfortable with this behaviour doesn't hurt. Disallowing the installation of 'customer experience' programs and the like helps. Turning off telemetry in Windows and MacOS helps. But the most positive thing you can do is scale back your use of cloud storage, by replacing it with either network drives or external drive backups. Obviously if you're running a business with multiple users in many locations this is not possible, but where you can do it, it removes some of the financial incentive for these businesses to push the cloud-centric way of operating into the future.

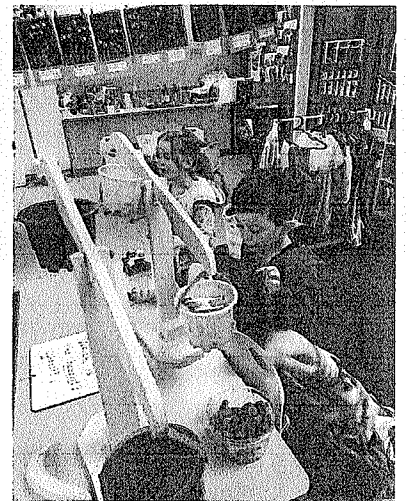
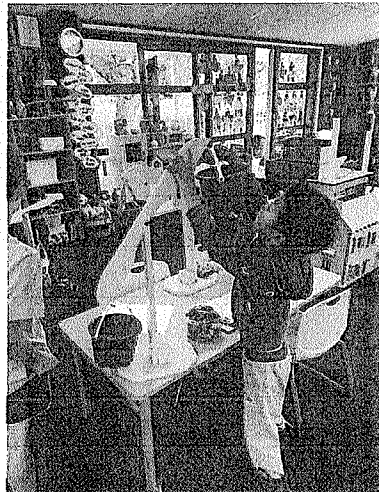
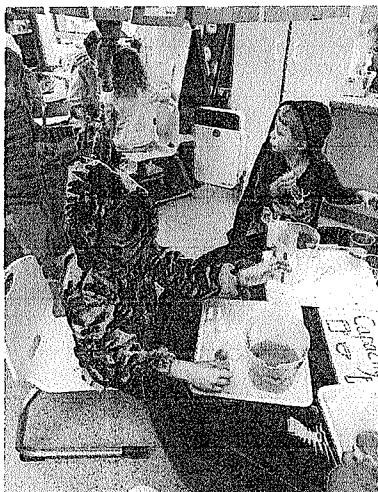

Thanks to all the parents who came and supported Athletics Day. The children had a great day and they all demonstrated great sportsmanship.

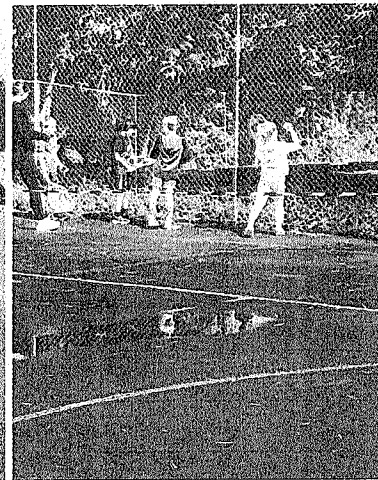
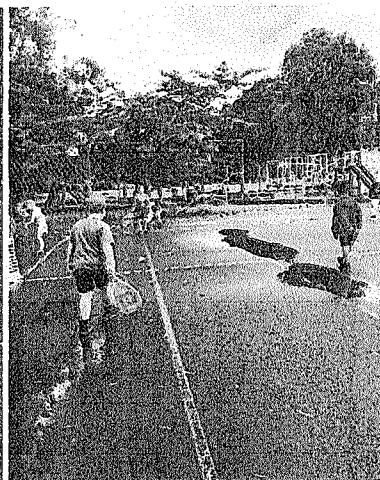
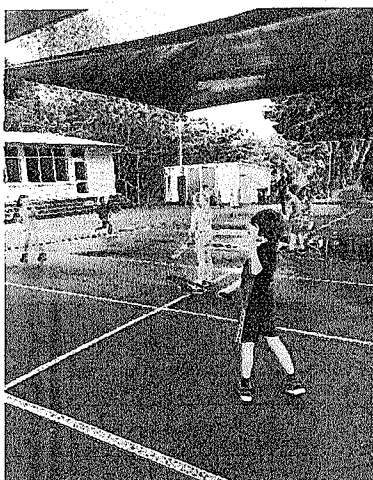


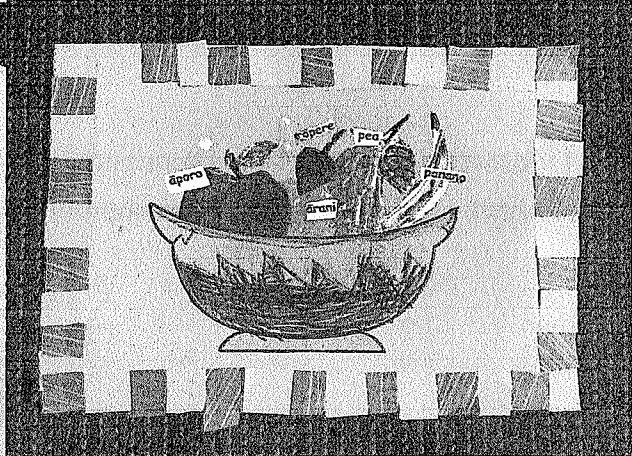
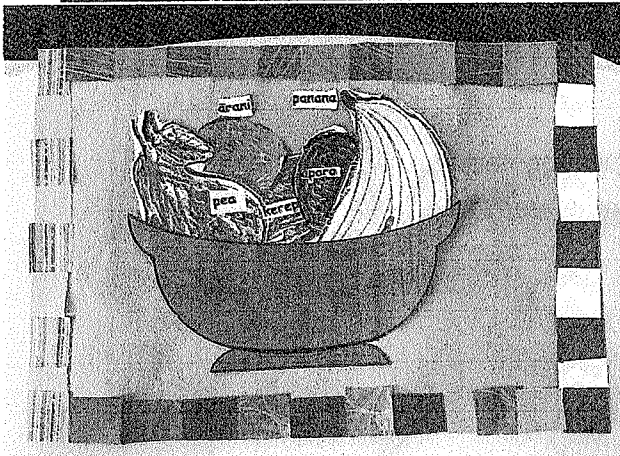
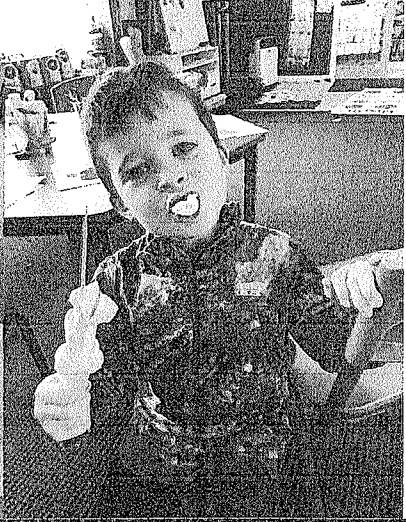
Kereru are having tennis lessons with Sasha

ERO VISIT

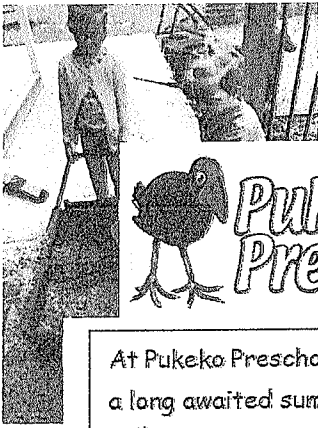

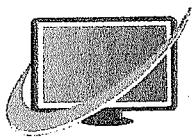
REPORTING POSSIBLE CRIMINAL ACTIVITY
