### **EDITORIAL**

## Eureka 2022 and the "Good Life"

We arrived in Eureka in 2007 from the "Big Smoke". Our place in Auckland had a huge piece of bush that we walked every day down to the Chelsea Sugar works on the harbours edge and then back home. Thirty minutes each way and a great way to keep fit.

We started the same walking habit in Eureka and quickly met many of our neighbours as we went along Eureka road every day after sitting in the office all day (and occasional night) looking after clients.

Wendy quickly got involved with the Eureka Express and met others from further than "our road" and we slowly met the community. Since then, things have definitely changed and no doubt will change a lot more yet.

Six farms along our road have become four. Older houses and sheds have been "buried". Four new houses have been built along the road with many significant upgrades and renovations at other homes.

So many neighbours have moved away and new neighbours have arrived that I can only guess at totals. Our direct neighbours are the fourth since we have been here.

Just goes to show that those of us in this area are normal New Zealanders with change being constant. One of our businesses is involved in household moving and we see how many New Zealanders move every year. Eureka is no different.

We have son and daughter-in-law in Rolleston and in the last six years we have seen thousands of homes built there complete with a brand new city centre. They love coming back here to the "good life".

Another son and daughter-in-law live in central Perth with our three grandsons. The boys love seeing Grandma for each of their birthdays and Wendy now knows Perth better than Hamilton to get around. She loves visiting (they have neat self contained Granny flat for us) and walking to and from school and meeting their friends in the new "big smoke".

A family Christmas a couple of years ago, saw us hire the Eureka hall for Christmas day to fit in all the family including Wendy's mother and brothers' family as well. Best big family Christmas ever plus the Grandkids loved running round outside playing games we all remembered from earlier childhoods. Cap guns at the ready outhunting birds was a favourite and all the exercise meant long sleeps.

Eureka road has been widened and a centre line painted since we arrived. Traffic volumes have risen lots no doubt due to Mrs Google identifying it as a shorter way to go, but I suspect many drivers do not realise they are visiting Eureka along with all the pleasures.

Interesting that the internet connections for residents has not been upgraded during our time here (I believe we were the first connection the day we arrived) and is unlikely to be improved I suspect. We use a satellite service now at a price equal to the old cable prices and have far superior results with no outages.

We run an internet business from home that has clients in many countries and to have a business like that, yet live in the "middle of no-where" we need good internet and power. Our generator kept us going after the latest storm power outages.

When anyone asks us "where do we live", we proudly answer "in Eureka" and wait for the "and where is that" question. Seems very few New Zealanders have heard of our community. Maybe none of us want to have lots more people here so we hide it when talking to strangers. We say we are surrounded by many more dairy cows than people and a busy day on our road is three milk tankers going past.

Then we talk about having some space around our house, our own beef on the BBQ, our own veggies from the garden, homemade jams with fruit from our trees, our chooks and they all say we are living the "good life". You can hear the sighs after that. We don't know how lucky we are!

When we travel overseas and describe Eureka to people we meet they all want to come visit our community. We don't tell them about the wine we have made or the still we have as that may be just a bit much.

Make sure you proudly tell everyone you meet, that you live in Eureka and it is full of wonderful people and you are part of the "Good Life".



Not long afterwards Gordon and Norma purchased a little home in Waipiata (of Rail Trail fame now) and Gordon went contracting, bullding miles of fences over the next few years. Three more children arrived, Carolyn, Julie and Murray during this time in Central Otago.

Back in Dunedin Gordon had a yen to return to the North Island and in 1964 the family moved up to the Hauraki Plains where they landed their first and only share-milking (39%) job at Waitakaruru. Both Gordon and Norma milked, a new experience for Norma initially. They stayed in that job for 13 years and developed their hobby of showing their young stock with great success. All five children attended Hauraki Plains College, in Ngatea. In 1977 Gordon and Norma purchased their first 100 acre farm in Kaihere. Gordon was kept busy stumping the peat, lots of Kauri, and in his spare time he finished the building of 2 beach houses, one at Tairua and one at Katikati.



The children are encouraged to pick fruit for themselves to eat during break times, although we are finding the pears very hard to reach!









# KOOKING WITH KAZZA

#### **CARROT CAKE**

1 1/4 cups of rice oil or similar

2 cups raw sugar

4 eggs

2 ½ cups wholemeal flour

1 ½ tsp cinnamon

1 tsp salt

3 cups grated carrot (3 carrots)

2 tsp baking soda

Walnuts or sultanas optional

Beat oil and sugar until combined. Add eggs one at a time and beat well.

In a separate bowl combine flour, cinnamon, salt, carrot and walnuts.

Add the two mixtures together and add baking soda.

Pour into a greased and lined 23cm tin. Bake at 160 deg for 80-90 minutes.

Cool and then ice with lemon cream cheese icing.

Icing- 125 g cream cheese, 40g butter, 2 cups icing sugar, 2 tbsp lemon juice.

Soften the cream cheese and butter and beat together, add icing sugar and lemon juice.



### Anna's Russian Fudge

200g butter

1 can condensed milk

• 3/4 cup full cream milk

2 Tablespoons golden syrup

4 cups sugar

1 tspn pure vanilla essence

### Directions

- 1. Put all ingredients, apart from vanilla essence, in a pot and bring to the boil, lower the heat and simmer for approximately 17-20 minutes stirring all the time.
- 2. In a bowl/cup of cold water drop a little of the fudge mixture (test throughout the 20 mins of simmering), when it is at the soft ball stage remove from heat. Pour into a mixing bowl.
- 3. Add vanilla essence and beat with an electric beater for 5 minutes until you can see it starting to set. (be careful as its really hot)
- 4. Pour into greased tin (lined with baking paper) and place in fridge to cool and set. 5.Cut into pieces once set and keep in the fridge or freezer



It means we are able to feed our bodies with produce that contains no nasties, no sprays as everything are grown around organic principles. It is very satisfying to be able to share this with our family, friends, Neighbours and community. Our honesty box has resided at the gate now for quite some years, and it has been an experience, and I must add it is comforting to know that there are more honest than dishonest people in the world. It has been a passionate hobby, as well as a wonderful way to become connected to the community and to meet some wonderful characters out there who have graced our gates over these past years.

Our honesty box story began due to a wonderful Fig tree that began producing far more than what our immediate family could inhale. Years on and post the recent destructive winds we have 69 Fig trees planted of varied varieties and production stages. Those of you who have read this column over the past 12 months would know this Fig orchard is in addition to a very large vegetable garden that graces the once upon a time grazing paddock, a seriously interesting looking flock of chickens, a large citrus orchard, and much more, I must also add and equally much more to come if there were more hours in a day.

Come April with the help of our `Eureka Poultry farm' from Hoopers Road we will be adding 30 more layers to our current tally of 30 laying hens. Sourcing our hens locally was important to us and our local Poultry farm have been wonderful folks to deal with whilst organising our order. Supporting local produce and businesses is all part of the effort to live sustainably and we are excited to be able to fill even more customers egg orders.

Our Humble Little Garden has definitely filled our plate, in more ways than one. I must report that these days the plate is always full, and everything on that plate come meal time is from this property. This is the part that is good for the soul, and was always our goal throughout our journey to this point. It is the real reward and can be very satisfying.

This year the aim is to build on what works, try not to spread ourselves so thin, and get with the program by introducing the honesty box app that has been pivotal for some other honesty box owners out there.



### **March Garden checklist:**

- ✓ Daffodils can be planted anytime between now and end of May.
- ✓ Protect spring bulbs from Slugs and Snails.
- ✓ Now is a great time to start planning to sow and mend the lawn if required.
- ✓ Prepare winter garden beds with Compost, Lime and Sheep pellets.
- ✓ Cut back perennials and replace with new ones.
- ✓ Plant and new trees, shrubs, hedging as over the coming months this will be valuable time for the new plants to get established.
- ✓ Planting of new winter seedlings to begin now such as Broccoli, Cabbage, Spinach, Silver beet, beetroot, Brussel sprouts etc.
- ✓ Feed Citrus plants to help with plant health and fruit production.
- ✓ Trim, shape, prune hedging and shrubs.
- ✓ Continue to deadhead roses to encourage flowering for as long as possible.
- ✓ Trim and prune lavender following flowering.
- ✓ Plant your poppy seedlings!
- ✓ Go check out the local honesty boxes!!

### Heat and movement

Computers are of course made out of rocks. Rocks that we taught to think using lightning mind you, but rocks nonetheless. So there is a more primitive aspect to them. One of those aspects is, like most metals, they react to heat, and parts of them expand and contract accordingly. This is generally not a problem for laptops, because so much of them is made out of plastic and/or designed to quickly dissipate heat. But desktop computers are another story.

One thing which may happen to you as we come into the hot season is that, as the case and other components of your computer expand with the heat, either a RAM (memory) stick or PCle card (often a graphics card) may imperceptibly 'pop out' of their slot on the motherboard. A tell-tale symptom of this is that the computer stops booting, or only boots intermittently. There are many reasons why a computer may boot intermittently, but this is a common one to consider at this time of year, going from cold into hot weather.

To check if this is the problem, and to fix it if it is, all that is required is to pop the RAM stick or PCle card out of their socket (pretty simple to do, there are catches that you have to loosen in either case, but describing the process is beyond the scope of this article), then pop them back in again. If the computer boots after this point, you've probably found your culprit. Of course you need to make sure you're doing this safely - keep the power off at the wall, keep one hand on the metal of the case at all times (or use an antistatic strap), and never touch the gold connectors on the card/stick.

These sorts of things can also happen going into the cold of winter, and for the same reasons; the metal contraction causes movement, which sometimes dislodges something. Even things like power supply cables can sometimes be slightly pushed out. All circuitry eventually dies for this reason - the expansion/contraction of the metals causes micro-fractures over time, which eventually stops circuits from connecting. Luckily, most computers last a good long time nowadays despite the earth's rotation around the sun. Rocks powered by lightning that stop working because of the movement of the planet, wielded by the descendants of apes. How very primitive.

### **Printer Costs**

I have, once or twice, been given something printed out by a client from on-screen instructions, as if the act of printing itself converted the written word from a state of mere *virtual* being into a more corporeal reality. In the modern age, such pockets of luddite resistance are rarely encountered, but that's not to say that printing does not have it's uses. You can, for example, use it to make the thing upon which you're reading this.

The cash point of printers is always ink, or in the case of laser printers, toner – that's how they get you. The printers themselves are usually cheap, but the ink and toner is designed to keep you indebted for life. For toner cartridges there isn't much of a way around this, but for ink cartridges there are a few ways you can scrimp and save on the coloured liquid. For starters 'knock off' cartridges are usually to be found, usually in PBtech or Warehouse Stationary.


These are non-name-brand cartridges which have the same characteristics and ink type as the branded cartridges. Printer cartridge refill shops also are around, and the product is usually ok, but usually not too much cheaper than the knock off brands. The necessity to keep a shop open eats into margins. A better approach is to find a printer which has larger cartridges – Epson and Canon have a few of these. A larger cartridge means less plastic in the environment, and overall the cost per ml of ink is cheaper.

Lastly, for some printers at least, you can actually buy refill kits and refill the cartridges yourself – although these are becoming harder to come by. It is a fiddly job, with a lot of ink spill and coloured hands inevitable, but if you buy the ink in large quantities, you can make printing virtually free. Well, until the printer itself breaks down. So maybe don't buy too much ink.

That's all from me folks - hope everything is going better for everyone this year.



# NEWS FROM YOUR WAIKATO DISTRICT COUNCILLOR - 20 FEBRUARY 2022

Welcome back to Council news for 2022. Holidays in January now seem a long time ago.

I hear many properties in Eureka & surrounds were without power after Sunday 13th's (to quote WEL Networks) "severe weather event" which put a huge amount of stress

onto farmers and householders. On Wednesday 15<sup>th</sup> the power companies were still reconnecting around 50 milking sheds; hence the long delay in restoring power to many homes. Our house had no power until 2.30am on Thursday morning but we were very fortunate that we had power to our workshop and water pump so our animals had water and we could utilise the workshop power to some extent to keep our freezer going (and most importantly charge our mobile phones).

During the summer I was able to watch a live feed of submitters appearing before the Local Government Commission who are considering objections to the Waikato District Council *Proposed Representation Review*. The final outcome will be released in April.

Council resumed meeting on 8<sup>th</sup> February. After a brief period of meeting at Ngaruawahia we are now back to Zoom. During the last few weeks Council has heard submissions to the **Easter Trading Policy and Speed Management Bylaw**.

This week we consider the submissions to the Dog Control Bylaw and Policy. In total 663 submissions were received. Over three days we will hear from around 101 individuals and groups who have made submissions and have indicated they want to speak in support of their submission at the hearing. Deliberations on this policy & bylaw will take place over three days in late March.

\*\*\*\*\*

The Hamilton Section of the Expressway is nearing completion and is expected to open in mid 2022. The chip sealing is completed and 80% of the final asphalting is done. Traffic has just been switched onto part of the new road near Tamahere and the focus is now on the Southern Intercharge at Tamahere and the Resolution Drive extension which will connect the city at the Resolution Interchange.

Puketaha Road will be closed for two weeks from 24<sup>th</sup> February to enable contractors to install a drainage culvert under the Expressway bridge and widen the road, with a further two weeks of traffic management after it reopens.

\*\*\*\*\*\*

After an eight-year process, on 17<sup>th</sup> January 2022 independent commissioners released their decision on the **Proposed Waikato District Plan**, marking a momentous day for the Waikato District.

As part of the review process, Council received over 1000 submissions from residents, community groups, hapū and iwi, commercial businesses and stakeholders.

Following 120 days of hearings with the community and stakeholders, the Proposed District Plan decision has been developed with a focus on our communities having opportunities to thrive and be connected, whilst meeting the growth needs that the district continues to have.

From 17<sup>th</sup> January forward any development or subdivision will need to be assessed under both the Operative District Plan (ODP) and the decisions version of the Proposed District Plan (PDP). Council staff only became aware of the content of the new Proposed District Plan at the same time it was released so it will take additional time for our planners to work through applications and give planning advice under both the ODP and PDP.

Council anticipates the number of enquiries at this time will be much higher than usual due to the release of the Proposed District Plan but will endeavour to process applications and answer enquiries as soon as possible.
