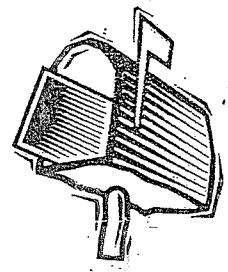

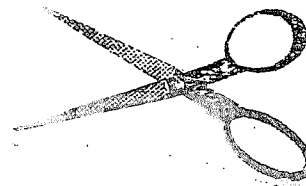

In recent years Margaret also joined the Hall Committee and her common sense approach and input was highly valued. When she put her hand up to take over the secretarial and booking duties last September I knew that everything was in good hands.

I have lost a very dear friend and colleague and the Eureka community has lost a fully contributing member who was loved and respected by all who knew her. You are not alone in your grief Maurice. Please accept sincere sympathy in your sudden huge loss. Margaret will be very sadly missed

We have people within the club that can explain how the game is played. We start at 7.30pm but names need to be in by 7.25pm

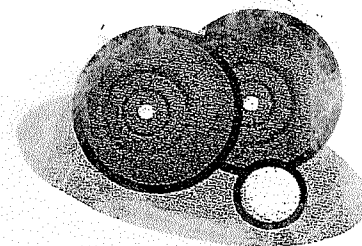

KOOKING WITH KAZZA

SHIRLEY'S WALNUT CRISPS

300g butter
1 ½ cups sugar
1 egg

3 ½ cups flour
4 tsps baking powder

Topping

280g walnut pieces
3-4 tsps sugar



Line a 39cm x 27cm oven tray with baking paper. Cream the butter and sugar. Beat in the egg. Sift in the flour and baking powder. Mix until smooth. Pat out on the oven tray. Sprinkle with the nuts, lightly pressing in. Sprinkle over the sugar. Chill for 30 mins. Preheat oven to 170C. Bake for 15-20 mins until golden brown. Leave to cool slightly, then cut into squares.

FEJOA CRUMBLE SLICE

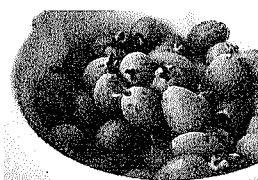
Base and Crumble

2 cups flour
1/2 cup rolled oats
1/2 tsp baking powder
1/2 tsp cinnamon
1/8 tsp salt

125g melted butter
1/2 cup brown sugar
1 egg
1 tsp vanilla essence

Fejoa filling

2 cups fejoas, scooped out of skins (approx 15 large)
1 tbsp brown sugar
1/2 tsp cinnamon



Preheat oven to 180C. Line a 20cm square tin with baking paper. Cream the butter and sugar. Add the egg and vanilla. Combine the flour, rolled oats, BP, cinnamon and salt in a bowl. Add to wet ingredients. Beat slowly until combined. Take 2 1/2 cups of this mixture and press into the tin. Set aside remaining mixture. Bake for 12 mins. While the base is cooking, prepare the filling. Chop the fejoas and add cinnamon and sugar. Once base is cooked, remove from oven and pour over fejoa mixture evenly. Crumble the remaining dough mixture over the fruit filling. Return to oven and cook approx another 20 minutes until top is golden brown. Serve hot with vanilla ice cream or cold.

TASTY MEATBALLS

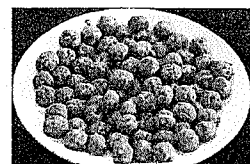
500g beef mince
250g sausage meat
1 egg
1/2 fresh breadcrumbs

2 tsps curry powder
2 tsps chopped parsley
1 large onion chopped finely

Sauce

1/2 cup water
1/2 cup tomato sauce
2 tsps malt vinegar

3 tsps worcestershire sauce
2 tsps sweet chilli sauce
1/2 cup packed brown sugar
2 tsps fruit chutney



Preheat oven to 180C. Place all ingredients into a large bowl. Whisk egg before adding. Combine with your hands or a wooden spoon. Form into small balls, about a heaped tsp size. Place in a lightly greased roasting dish and bake for approx 25 mins. When cooked pour off any excess fat. Add sauce ingredients to a medium size saucepan and bring to the boil. Remove from heat and pour over meatballs and return to oven for a further 20 minutes. **They are great hot or cold.**

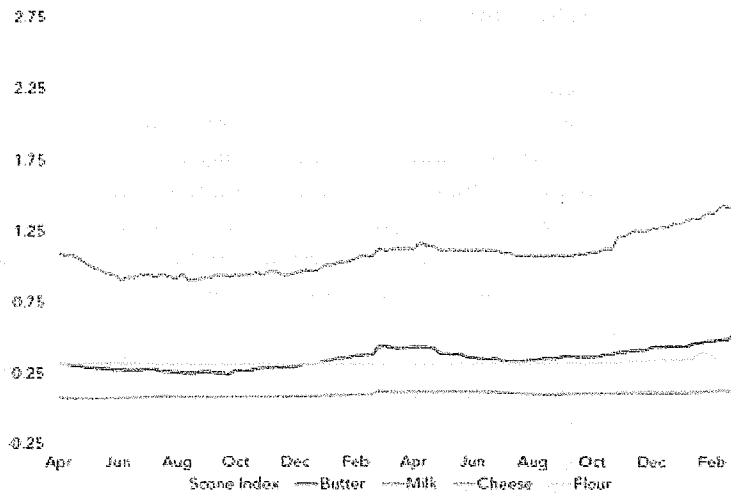
Cost of a cheese scone increased

Worm Farm

Setting up your Worm Farm

1. Purchase your Worm Farm from your local DIY or garden centre, or check out some of the guides online to make your own.
2. Choose a shady position for your worm farm and ensure it is easily accessible to feed your scraps straight to the worms.
3. If you have purchased your worm farm, assemble as per the instructions.
4. Once you have your worm farm set up you need worms. You will need about 1000 (250g) worms to get started, and they can be purchased from a garden centre or DIY store, or if you know someone with a worm farm they may be willing to share!
5. Next you need some bedding material for your worm farm. Worm farm kits will usually supply coir brick. Other suitable bedding materials include: shredded newspaper, office paper or cardboard, brown leaves and straw.
6. Add some compost to help get your worm farm started.
7. Add the worms to the top tray and let them settle in.

Feeding your worms

8. Allow your worms a few days to settle into their new home then add a handful of food scraps to the surface area. Your compost worms will eat raw and cooked food and vegetable scraps from your kitchen. Coffee grinds, tea bags, dust from vacuum cleaners and soaked egg cartons can also be added. Chopping up scraps, or even blending them, will make it easier for the worms to eat your leftovers, quickly!
9. Avoid feeding meat, dairy products or bread as these can attract unwanted pests. Onions, citrus peel and tomatoes are very acidic, so are generally not added, however, small amounts can be used as long as they are well mixed in with other food.
10. As a rule of thumb worms eat approximately $\frac{1}{2}$ their body weight in food, so if you start with 250g of worms, you can feed them approximately 125g of food a day.
11. Place a worm blanket or wool blanket on top of the worms to keep the worm farm moist and dark.

Using your worm castings and worm tea

12. Worm farms generally have a tap so you can collect the worm tea in your watering can as it is produced. Water it down to the colour of weak tea before using on your garden.
13. While you can collect and use your worm tea at anytime, collecting the castings (or worm poo), will depend on how many worms you have and how active they are. Generally, once the worms have processed the food scraps in the lower tray, you can remove this tray to use the castings in your garden, or collect small amounts to use in potting mix or seed raising mix at other times.

Cellphone Insecurity

Occasionally I hear from people who've had some dodgy software installed on their phone - usually an Android phone. Unfortunately this is almost always user error; either they deliberately downloaded a dodgy app, or they were convinced to do so by a scammer. Dodgy apps themselves are pretty hard to come by - both the Android and Apple stores are reasonably well locked-down, in terms of what they will allow in, and while it's not unheard of that something will slip through, it's less likely than on the PC, where you can literally download anything and run it provided the OS doesn't detect a virus in it (there are attempts by Microsoft to lock things down further in Windows 11 - but more on that another time).

Having said all that, dodgy apps seem to be easier to come by on the Android store, and the most common things I see are ones which pop up ads even when the apps themselves aren't being used. My guideline? Uninstall everything you don't need. And try not to install anything which contains ads (this is always mentioned in the app description). It's tempting to just select the first result in the app store's search engine, but it pays to take the time to look at reviews, overall scores and the app description field itself.

What are the most common effects of dodgy apps? Usually ads as above, but sometimes increased power usage and lower battery life. Sometimes this is the result of the app using your phone to do 'crypto mining' (more on that another time), sometimes more nefarious stuff. But you don't really tend to see 'viruses' on phones, per se - so the use of antivirus software like McAfee or Norton is more likely to just waste battery life. A good rule of thumb is: if you start seeing weird behaviour after installing a particular app - it is probably that app causing it.

Lastly I wanted to address some of the spookier stuff, like people side-loading hidden apps on other people's phones and then using those phones to track them, that sort of thing. Luckily that's not possible without physical access to the device itself, and without having the user's pin or swipecode. So if you're breaking up with someone or divorcing, it's probably a good time to change the passwords or pins on all your devices. Not to be paranoid, but just as a precaution. A better course of action if you suspect a device is compromised, is to factory reset it. You'll need to get your data and contacts off first, but at that point, that should be the least of your worries.

I'd also mention sim-swapping attacks, but that's beyond the scope of this article - generally-speaking, be careful what you share publicly on social media and you should be fine. Google the subject if interested. All-in-all phones are usually pretty safe, provided you or someone else doesn't do something dodgy with them. But like all computing devices, they have their flaws.
