



NEWS FROM YOUR WAIKATO DISTRICT COUNCILLOR - 25th JULY 2022



Waikato District Council is continuing talks with NZTA and KiwiRail about the **closure of Telephone Road**. We do not support the closure and have made our stance very clear. A very large turnout of residents from Puketaha and its surrounding areas, contractors and other regular users of Telephone Road attended the public drop in session in late June. Also NZTA received a large number of written submissions.

Telephone Road was originally built when Eureka, Newstead, Tauwhare etc were part of the Gordonton Woodlands estate and was ideally placed to access the districts linked to Woodlands. Nothing has changed – it is still the best road to service the rural areas northwest of the city. We

will continue to fight for its reopening.

On 12 July I attended the opening of the Hamilton section of the Waikato Expressway. My nearest access to the Expressway is via the Pardoa Blvd interchange accessed off the Gordonton-Wairere Drive roundabout. We visit family in Cambridge on a regular basis so, with the closure of Telephone Road, we had been travelling south via Wairere Drive so it is a pleasure to have access to a fast route south without having to travel through busy city roads.

Last week I attended the **Local Government Conference** in Palmerston North. It was a very interesting conference themed *Te Wa Heke Mai – Future*. I thought it may focus on Three Waters Reform. However, while this was mentioned, the main focus was on well-being (cultural, environmental, economic and social) and the reform of local government. I was very impressed at the growth in Palmerston North since I last visited – a new inland port, a fast expanding university contributing to their region's economy and one of only four NZ airports that open 24/7, a lot of heritage collections, art galleries and great cafes and restaurants.

In my last newsletter I announced that I would not be seeking re-election at this year's local government elections. Please give consideration to standing for one of the two positions of councillor in the new Woodlands-Tamahere Ward. You are welcome to phone me if you would like any information about the role of Councillor.

All the information and nomination forms can be found at <u>Stand (waikatodistrict.govt.nz)</u> A link to the recording of a Candidate Information Evening can also be found on this web page.

You don't need any special qualifications to stand. Elected members come from all backgrounds and walks of life.

Nominations opened on 15 July and all nomination forms need to be in before 12 August 2022.

What you need to do to complete your nomination -

- ° You need to have two people to nominate you they must be over 18 and enrolled to vote in the area you wish to be a candidate for.
- * You need to pay a nomination deposit of \$200. This deposit applies to each election position you want to be a candidate for.
- * Your nomination must be received by 12pm (noon) on Friday 12 August 2022.
- " The Returning Officer cannot make any extensions to this deadline.

Applications are now open for "Better off Funding". Council opened applications last week for the first instalment of this funding allocated by the Department of Internal Affairs (DIA) as part of the Three Waters Reform programme. Waikato has been allocated \$7.88m in this first instalment to help councils and communities transition to the new system for delivering three waters.

Applications are welcomed from anyone across the Waikato District who has a project or initiative that meets the DIA criteria:

- *support communities to transition to a sustainable and low-emissions economy, including building resilience to climate change and natural hazards;
- °delivery of infrastructure and/or services that:

1.enable housing development and growth, with a focus on brownfield and infill development opportunities where those are available,

2.support local place-making and improvements in community well-being.

Council has formed a separate assessment panel which will provide a recommendation to Council on which projects/initiatives should be submitted to the DIA.

The application process opened on Monday 18 July and closes at 5.00pm on Friday 19 August 2022.





COOKING WITH KAZZA

SLOW COOKER BEEF

700g stewing beef, cut into 2cm cubes

½ cup water

1/4 cup soy sauce


1/4 cup brown sugar

2 tbsp flour

1 tbsp sesame oil

3 tsp crushed garlic

1 tsp beef stock powder



Place the beef in the slow cooker.

Mix all the other ingredients together and pour over.

Stir to combine.

Cook on low 8 hours.

Serve with rice or mashed potatoes.

SMASHED POTATOES

4 medium potatoes, skin on

2 tbsp olive oil

2 tbsp melted butter

1 tsp mixed herbs

1 tsp fresh rosemary(optional)

Salt and pepper

Preheat oven to 180 deg.


Prick the potatoes several times with fork and microwave until soft, about 10 mins. Place potatoes on a baking tray and using a

potato masher push down to smash them open.

Drizzle over olive oil and butter. Sprinkle with herbs, salt and pepper.

You can sprinkle over any grated cheese also.

Bake for 30 minutes.



HUMBLE LITTLE GARDEN ON A PLATE

Hopefully everyone is managing to keep themselves warm enough at the moment. Despite knowing quite well what winter brings, it always surprises me how cold it gets at this time of year; with this year being no different than most.

Here at 1151, I would have to be honest and say this cooler weather of late has deterred me a little from venturing into the garden as much as I would like to tell you. Month to date harvesting has been more the focus, ensuring I have some seedlings on the go, and just chipping away at removing old leaves around the place so no nasty bacteria can survive before spring welcomely joins us.

However, August is the month before spring. Like with any project worth doing, the most important part is building a good foundation. In the garden this is no different. In the garden our soil is our foundation.

In our edible gardens during August, it's a great chance to take some time to examine the soil in the garden and get some TLC underway to ensure great successes later. Fertiliser can be the best TLC you can give the garden before spring planting.

Fertiliser should be applied approximately two weeks before planting, ideally you want to spread a layer between 50mm to 100mm across the garden, then dig this through the existing soil. Ensure the current soil is not water logged when doing this as you may find while digging over the soil you are actually compacting the soil, so choose your day well to avoid this.

Some fertiliser options are aged animal manure, garden compost, woodchip mulch, spent coffee grinds, mushroom compost. These are all excellent additions when dug into the soil. Animal manures are probably the best as they contain good quantities of nutrients which your soil will thank you for by returning a successful crop. Lime can also be used to give the soil a boost. Buying this in bulk as we found out from an animal/farming stores can save you a lot of money, so shop around for such additions.

Additionally, a sometimes-overlooked option to improving soil is introducing more worms. Worms will naturally aerate your soil and create as well as distribute their own organic matter and nutrients into the soil. They produce their own fertiliser in the form of 'castings'. If you can get your hands onto some worm juice, don't hesitate to use this also.

Guide for what fertiliser/food is required for soil:

- Nitrogen (primary nutrient) provides green leaves
- Phosphorus (primary nutrient) vital for the development of roots, flowers and fruit
- Potassium (primary nutrient) for fixing poor root development
- Magnesium (major nutrient) important for seed development and photosynthesis (the process plants use to convert sunlight into food)
- Calcium (secondary nutrient) use for vigorous growth and formation
- Iron (minor nutrient) without this photosynthesis would be impossible. To little iron results in yellowing between the veins of leaves
- Boron (minor nutrient) this is needed for normal growth of stems and leaves, including fixing yellow leaves

Once you have fertilised your soil, it should then be re-applied every six months for best results.

August to do list in the Humble Garden:

- Provide some TLC for the soil (as above).
- Sow seeds of Tomatoes, Cabbage, Celery, Spring Onion, Onions, Silver beet, Spinach, Melons, Cucumbers, Capsicum and Lettuce into trays for transplanting later.
- As is begins to warm sow directly into the soil, Carrots, Parsnips, Beetroot, Peas and Radish.
- Beginning of August sow Parsnips, Turnips, Swedes, Peas and Broad Beans.
- Place Seed Potatoes into a tray in a sunny position for at least a month before planting.
- Plant Asparagus crowns directly into the garden. For best results plant in well-draining soil with lots of compost added 2 weeks before planting.
- Plant strawberries if you have not done so already. Add a clean layer of pea straw mulch or wood chips around the plants to deter pests and to keep the berries up off the dirt. Allow for 5 plants per person to ensure there is enough at harvest time.
- Plant new Rhubarb plants and lift and divide any established Rhubarb clumps. Feed plants with lots of fertiliser (as above).
- Plant seedlings of Cabbage, Cauliflower, Lettuce, Broccoli, Silver beet and Spinach. Try planting sage around edges as sage can help deter pest.
- Protect seedlings from slugs and snails.
- If your fruit trees had any issues with brown rot or fungus last to control sooty Mould, mites, aphids and white fly on fruit and citrus trees spray with a Bug Oil spray. The oil will effectively smoother the pests and their eggs to protect your plants. A low toxic option.
- Plant new citrus, blueberries and deciduous fruit trees.
- Fertilise all fruit trees to ensure you get a bumper crop.
- August is a great time to plant Roses, and shift any shrubs etc. before spring.

A J Gully reserve restoration.

The Seeley Gully group and other volunteers meet on a regular basis most Mondays at 9:30am, to undertake various environmental conservation tasks within the park.

Removal of environmental weeds, track maintenance, restoration planting, and stream erosion control.

Hillcrest Stadium: Transformation from the Roots Up.

The group meets on a regular basis to undertake various environmental conservation activities within the park to recreate a 'Kahikatea Forest' e.g., planting native plants, releasing planted plants, mulching. Meet at the 'Deer Stalkers' Hall Car Park at 1pm, 138 Wairere Dr.

Friends of Mangaonua Esplanade

The Friends of Mangaonua Esplanade meet most Thursday mornings from 9:15am to 12:15pm across the road from 11 Silverdale Road.

We mostly weed and some planting in order to restore the native forest to this branch of the Mangaonua gully in Silverdale.



WHAT IS A 'ZERO WASTE' LIFESTYLE?

Have you wondered 'what is a Zero Waste lifestyle' when you've seen or heard about the idea? The 'Zero Waste' goal is to reduce waste, and potentially eliminate it altogether.

The aim is to send nothing to landfill, and to stop dumping rubbish on the land or in the oceans. We can move towards this by:

- reducing what we buy and use,
- reusing and repairing things as much as possible,
- recycling some products,
- composting organic material.

IS ZERO WASTE ACHIEVABLE?

Zero waste may be more of an ideal rather than an actual target.

But it provides some ideas for people to use to help reduce how much waste we create.

HOW CAN I LIVE A MORE ZERO WASTE LIFESTYLE?

A key way to cut down on the waste we make, is to stop or reduce how much/often we buy throwaway items.

Many of the items we regularly buy are single use. A first step to reduce waste is to consider what you buy, and how you can make some swaps to reusable items.

Buying items that we can use for longer, or that we can recycle also reduces waste. And buying second hand gives items a longer useful life.

WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS OF LIVING A ZERO WASTE LIFESTYLE?

Why do people choose to live a lower waste lifestyle? Here are some of the benefits to reducing the amount of waste you create:

1. ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT

Moving to a lower waste lifestyle is a way to minimize your impact on the environment. Producing less waste means there is less rubbish going to landfill, or pollution on the land or in the sea.

2. COST SAVINGS

Buying throwaway items that need to be replaced can cost a lot of money over time. Sometimes the initial investment in a reusable item may be higher than the alternative disposable one. But over time, the investment may save you money.

3. HIGHER QUALITY ITEMS

Similar to the cost savings idea, when you go lower waste, you might decide to buy items that are a higher quality. Your purchases may be made from longer lasting materials, and designed to last for many years.

4. LESS EXPOSURE TO CHEMICALS

A zero waste lifestyle includes recyclable items like glass and metals, and biodegradable options like paper and cardboard.

This is instead of using single use plastic, which contain compounds that have been linked to health issues.

5. BE AN EXAMPLE

Working towards a zero waste lifestyle can influence those around you to give it a go too. It can start conversations about ways to reduce waste, encouraging others to give it a go too. In my experience, talking openly about the things I do to reduce waste has meant that many friends, and strangers online too, have asked me questions about my lifestyle. It's great to share zero waste ideas with people.

However, I hope I don't preach or sound smug, as I get it that my life is not the same as everyone's life. And that each of us has different choices available to us.




