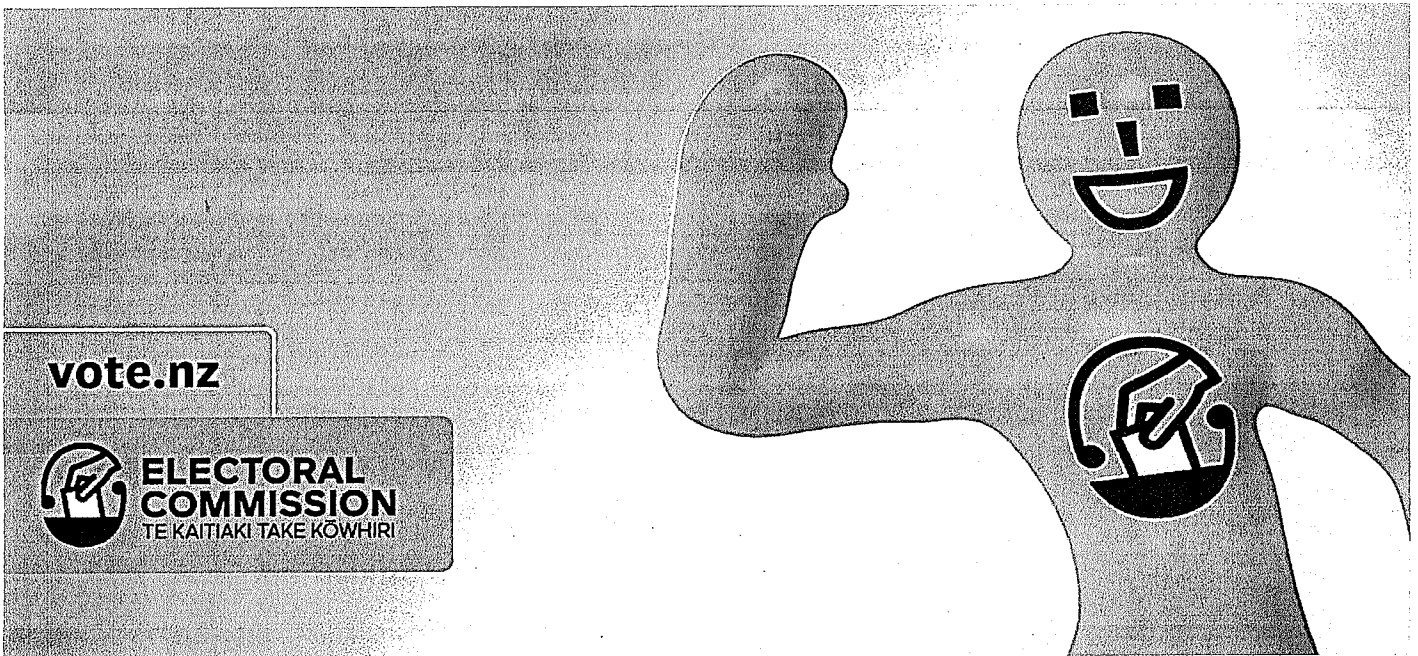

Eureka- the quiet retreat

After nearly half a century living at Eureka, Ann and Ken Mackay have moved to Cambridge for the later years of their retirement.

Ken shares a summary of their time at Eureka:

We arrived in NZ by boat in 1970 accompanied by our three children and all our worldly goods. I'd been appointed to the new University of Waikato and Ann was rapidly signed on also to help oversee undergraduate chemistry laboratory classes, both at the uni and at the Polytech. Settling into Hamilton and becoming friends of the museum, joining the archaeological society, various women's groups, playcentre, and other activities, we made some very good friends. These friends took a great interest in our plans to look for a bit of land and were most helpful. After about five years of living near Berkley intermediate, getting all the kids settled into good local schools, we started to look about us for a bit of land to stretch out in and to breathe. The old farm on Tauwhare Road had included some oaks and silver poplars probably from milling days and the block with most trees was a bit cheaper certainly comparable to city lots at that time, so really it was the trees that brought the Mackay family into the Eureka area. We bought in 1974, built a Lockwood (largely designed by Ann) and moved in mid-1975. The home among the trees provided a quiet, replenishing, nourishing retreat and the opportunity for some very novice rural ventures (previously shared with Eureka Express readers!). The early retirement years were quite busy. I enjoyed having more time to potter at home and Ann did sterling work with the Hamilton CAB, the Graduate Women Federation, and the Friends of the Hamilton Gardens while I got interested in astronomy. This time also included genealogical investigations to Canada and the US, as well as return trips to the UK. Ann and I also enjoyed river cruises in the Baltic and on the Danube. But best of all was always coming home to our beautiful leafy retreat at Eureka. Blessed by great, practically helpful, and tolerant neighbours, we managed to keep on living on our 11 and a half acres well into our eighties enjoying quiet peaceful days talking, reading and reminiscing together. We remember with gratitude especially our close neighbours, Graeme and Lynne Brewer, the Bargh family, Devon Ward, and Colin Duncan (whose expertise supported our determination to buy only second-hand cars). Now, in 2023, the property has been sold and hopefully the new owners will also enjoy the peace and friendliness of this very special part of the mighty Waikato. We now live near our daughter in Cambridge.

IN LOVING MEMORY of JENNIFER MACE

It was with great sadness that we learned of Jennifer's death on September 7th in Singapore, almost home from her last dream holiday , this time a Norwegian Cruise.

A few months later Jennifer made the decision to sell the farm homestead (but retain ownership of the farm) and move into Dalbeth Place next to her daughter Deidre. Deidre's husband, Fraser, was gravely ill and there Jennifer could more closely support Deidre and her five young children.

Recent years have seen Jennifer enjoy many more overseas holidays, follow her interests, and enjoy seeing her cherished grandchildren grow and mature.

To Jennifer's family, Pieta, Deidre, Campbell and Christine, and her precious nine grandchildren, goes our heartfelt sympathy in their huge loss.

SIGN LANGUAGE

Saturday 23rd September.

"International Day of Sign Languages: A World where Deaf People Everywhere can Sign Anywhere."

"Today, we share the WFD's vision of a world where deaf people everywhere can sign anywhere. A world where deaf people are seen as a part of the natural range of human diversity, & national sign languages are celebrated & used everywhere as part of national societies. The WFD calls upon all governments to take measures to ensure at least 50% of their children & youth know their national sign languages, as a step towards building societies in which deaf people everywhere can sign anywhere."

Acknowledging & respecting our mother languages is of utmost importance for those of us in the D/deaf community. Our ability to communicate seamlessly through sign language is a source of pride for individuals of all ages and abilities. Yet, feeling left out in other environments, like family events and workplaces, can be disheartening while accessing services like cafes, schools, and healthcare providers. The solution to this predicament lies in education and empathy. By learning our sign language, others can foster meaningful connections with us & make us feel included in all facets of life.

It's of utmost importance to acknowledge the Deaf community and culture and the benefits of Sign Language for infants born with hearing impairment, even though it can be difficult for new families to come to terms with. While it's natural for parents to desire their child to be able to hear and speak, it's essential to understand that being Deaf is not a disability. Their child can still thrive and communicate effectively within the Deaf community in numerous ways. The healthcare and education industries must prioritise understanding languages and inclusivity. Addressing hearing loss goes beyond the use of hearing aids or cochlear implants to facilitate speech. It is about empowering parents to make informed decisions for their D/deaf child. I highly recommend engaging with D/deaf parents and communities for valuable insights and understanding. Above all, respecting the freedom to use sign language anywhere is essential.

Ever since I was a toddler, I've relied on hearing aids to navigate the world around me. My parents emphasised the importance of being proactive and communicating effectively, which has served me well. I'm using two languages, English and sign language, and my BA degree has also allowed me to become proficient in other languages. When people ask how my hearing aids have helped me, my response depends on the situation. In busy, noisy environments like parking lots or public gatherings, but in places like airports or train stations, the constant background noise of announcements can be overwhelming and stressful.

Sign language is an incredibly effective means of communication, especially in public locations like airports and train stations, to ensure that everyone can benefit as everyone else. It's vital to display pertinent information on screens, such as "boarding number 454 now at Gate 4," to enhance the visual accessibility of sign language. During my global travels, I was pleasantly surprised to see flight attendants using sign language when I boarded the plane. In addition, the flight safety guide was always available on my seat or the screens in front of passengers, while train conductors and staff pointed to signs and timetables to guide me on my way. Ultimately, it's crucial to make information more accessible to everyone, and sign language is an ideal tool to accomplish this goal.

Mastering sign language is paramount, especially during disasters like devastating floods or raging wildfires. It enables us to communicate effectively and seek assistance, counsel, and direction in critical situations. The importance of sign language cannot be overstated, and it is essential to recognise its potential to make a meaningful impact in times of crisis. Have you given any thought to acquiring sign language skills?

UPDATE OCTOBER 2023

District News

Blueprints

Community aspirations for the future were a focus for the Council this month, and Councillors spent time considering feedback on local area 'blueprints' as we move closer to developing the next Long Term Plan (LTP) 2024-34.

The LTP will set the Council's work programmes and budgets for the next three years (from July 2024). Consultation on a draft LTP will be held early next year.

Local area blueprints were first developed between 2019 and 2022 to identify community aspirations and to prioritise initiatives to be taken by either the Council or the local community. They form part of a 'District Blueprint' to provide a 'picture' of how the district could progress over the next 30 years to address the community's social, economic and environmental needs, and to meet the Council's vision of 'Liveable, Thriving and Connected Communities'. Outcomes are dependent on LTP funding decisions as well as changes to the District Plan.

In the Tamahere-Woodlands Ward, there are 'Council-led' blueprints for Gordonton, Matangi and Tamahere, and – following the September meeting of the Council's Sustainability and Wellbeing Committee - these blueprints will now be updated in keeping with survey feedback received from your local community committees. More detailed feedback from Tamahere will be included as an addendum to the existing blueprint.

Congratulations to the Tauwhare Community Committee which has led a major effort to develop a Tauwhare blueprint in consultation with the community. A Council decision on whether to recognise this as a full blueprint (as urged by your local Ward councillors) has been deferred, but the community's aspirations were acknowledged, and the document will be published on the Council's website.

Speed limits

The Council has been asked to review District speed limits in line with the Government's 'Road to Zero' road safety strategy. Proposed speed limit changes near maraes, community halls, sports fields and schools are expected to come to the October Policy & Regulatory Committee meeting for consideration for public consultation. It's unfortunate this follows so closely on the Council's own Speed Limit Bylaw review in 2022. Please watch out for notification to have your say.

SH1B

A proposal for the upgrade of Telephone Road to allow it to reopen has been put forward for inclusion in Waka Kotahi's draft State Highway Investment Proposal (known as the SHIP). The draft SHIP is expected to be released shortly with the final SHIP to be confirmed early next year for inclusion in the 2024-27 National Land Transport Programme (NLTP). Funding is not guaranteed, however, as this project will be assessed and prioritised against other proposed roading projects in the region and around the country.

As the initial options for re-opening the Telephone Road railway crossing were costed at \$8-11 million (compared with a permanent closure option costed at \$2.5 million), Waka Kotahi and Waikato District Council are also working together to develop an alternative, cheaper option for consideration. As this would involve closing Holland Rd westbound from the intersection with Telephone Rd, Waka Kotahi and the District Council will seek community feedback to determine the feasibility of progressing this option. Please watch this space.

Please also note that Waka Kotahi intends to replace the current temporary electronic signage at the crossing with fixed signs about the closure – this is simply to allow the mobile signs to be reused elsewhere.

Recent Community meetings:

- **Bus trial** – Waikato Regional Council is working on final details for a two-year bus trial for Tamahere/Matangi/Tauwhare Pa using a 12-seater van, and ensuring no disruption to school bus services. The District Council will fund it from a budget set at \$200,000 per year.
- **New Tamahere Forum proposed** – At its September meeting Tamahere Community Committee discussed means of re-establishing a website for sharing community news. Watch this space.
- **New chair elected for Newstead Residents' Association** - Congratulations to Noel Smith who was elected chair of the Newstead Resident's Committee at its AGM on 17 September.

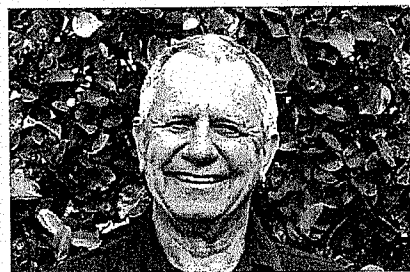

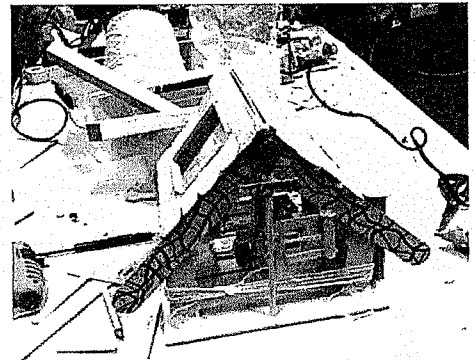
1ST AND 2ND IN CLUSTER SPEECHES

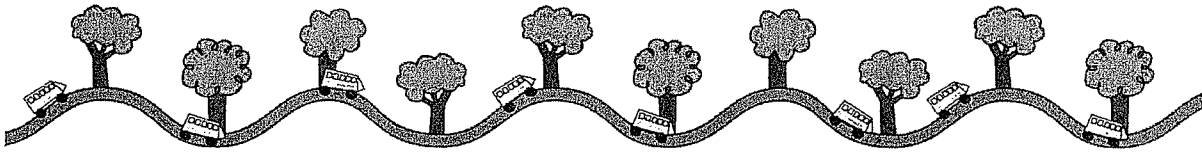

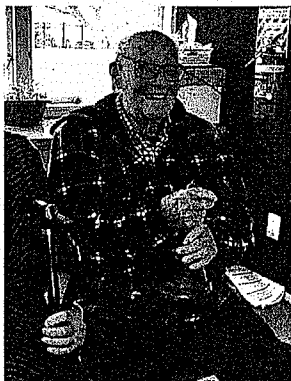

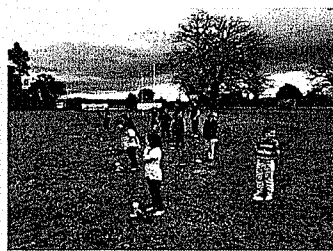


Special Guest/ Manuhiri Motuhake

Ladies a Plate

Butterscotch Self-Saucing Pudding (microwave)

1 cup self-flour ¼ cup sugar
50g butter ½ cup milk

Sauce

2 tbsp golden syrup 1 1/2 cups boiling water
25g butter

Add melted butter and milk to flour and sugar. Spread into a microwave ring pan. Stir sauce ingredients together has melted. Pour over the mixture in a ring pan. Cook on high for 7 minutes (650 watt oven)

Lemon Garlic Potatoes

4 potatoes peeled and cut into medium sized cubes

Juice and grated zest of 2 lemons 3 cloves garlic (finely chopped)

¼ cup olive oil salt and ground black pepper

Place all ingredients into a baking dish, ensuring that the potatoes are well coated with the rest of the mixture. Place into a pre-heated oven (200C) and cook for 45-50 minutes until potatoes are crispy. Turn occasionally during cooking to baste.



Upgrading your operating system

As a brief introduction, an operating system or 'OS' is the software which runs your computer - windows or linux for PC, MacOS for Macs, iOS for iPads or iPhones, Android for other smartphones. It does the busywork to manage your hardware and make sure you can run your apps. But like all things software-based, operating systems gather dust, so to speak, and cease to be usable eventually. There are many operating systems which are out of date, or soon to be out of date. Windows 7 and 8 are already unusable, while Windows 10 has 2 years to go before it will stop receiving security updates and cease to be safe on the net.

There are a few ways to get your windows PC up to Windows 11 before the cut-off date of October 14th, 2025. The first is to buy a new computer - not something I'd normally advise, but if your computer is over ten years old, it might be worth doing. The second is to upgrade your existing Windows 10 installation to Windows 11 - which, contrary to what Microsoft has said, works on 90% of computers out there, including ones as old as 15 years. Occasionally I'll run into a computer which won't upgrade for some reason, but the majority of computers do it without issue.

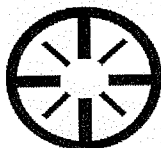
A third option is to do a clean installation of Windows 11 using the Windows 10 key. If you do this, Windows 11 makes it tricky to create a 'local' account (an account not tied to a particular microsoft ID) but it is possible. The advantages of a local account are that you can set a computer up to be resold without knowing the Microsoft account details of the buyer, and less tracking of your activities and data by Microsoft. 11 has grown on me, but it's still an over-designed re-jig of Windows 10 with the differences being largely superficial.

Similarly to Microsoft, Apple tells their customers they can't upgrade Mac's to the most recent version of MacOS due to hardware incompatibility. Sometimes this is true, but mostly it's not. And it's unfortunate because internet browsers only tend to support the more recent versions of MacOS, meaning an older Mac becomes useless on the internet. But a 2013 iMac can run the most recent MacOS "Ventura" without issue; the key to bypassing this forced obsolescence is a program called Opencore. Documentation is available, but it's very much an expert job to get this done - and you need to make sure you have your data backed up.

It's funny how computers are designed to run pretty much any software, but it's the software companies now telling us which computers we can use and which we can't. "Fight the power!", and all that. Linux and the open-source community are the only havens of sanity in this mess, but their userbase tends to be heavily techie and unfriendly to novices. I'd like for that to change, but such things tend to require the cooperation and structure which businesses provide and which open-source communities, typically, do not.

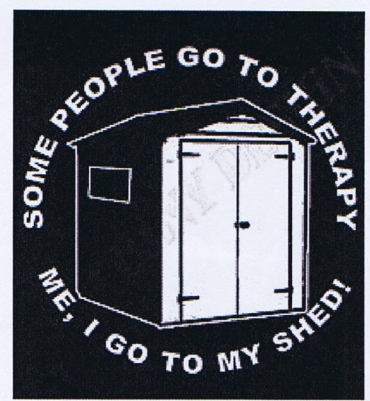
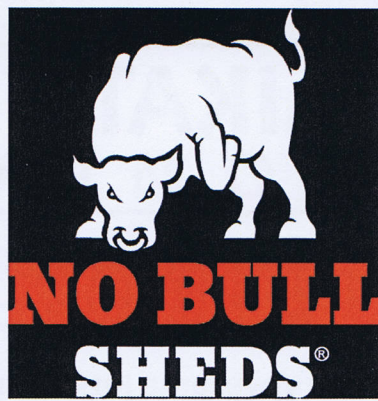
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Adding Lush To Our Front Lawn

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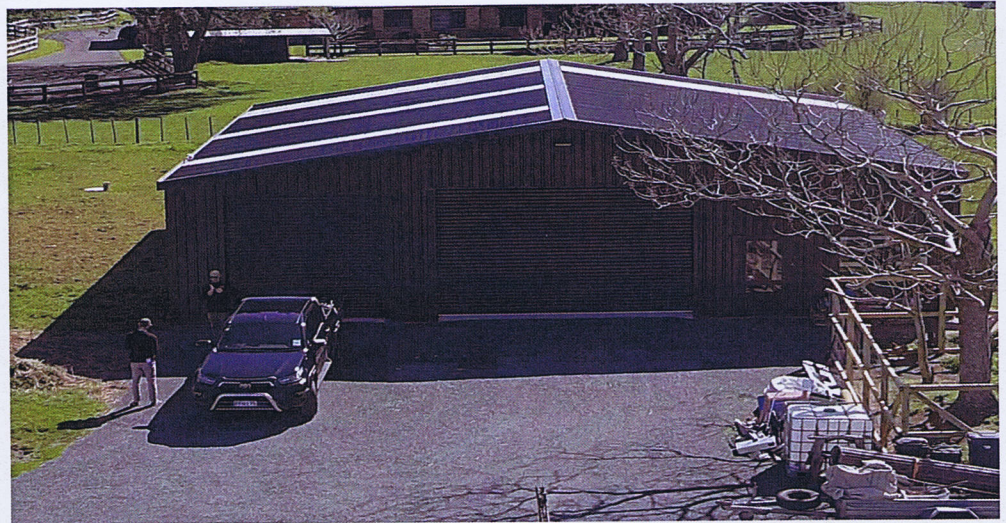
Awesome Kitset Shed
