

Steve and a team of guys help maintain the building, doing little maintenance jobs and I help out in the office, mainly responsible for setting up accounts for payment and sending out invoices and doing the GST.

Farming is an industry that neither Steve nor myself were born into. Steve was a butcher by trade before he went farming. Although it wasn't something that either of us had grown up with, we both really love the lifestyle it has provided us. We have been blessed to have been able to spend lots of time with our children as they grew up and now with our grandchildren. As I write this editorial, we are babysitting some grandies while their Mum attends an appointment in town. We have 1 wee grandson asleep in the bedroom while his older sister is enjoying time with 'Pa' on the farm.

While farming can be incredibly rewarding at times, the flip side is that it can be quite a cruel taskmaster and very isolating. Some people have found it a hard industry to be a part of and sadly, farming related suicides are too common. Both Steve and I joined Rural Support Trust about 6 or 7 years ago. The Trust is essentially made up of farmers who help other farmers. It's a confidential and free service available to anyone farming in NZ. Farming includes Dairy Farming, Drystock, Sheep & Beef, Deer, Duck, Poultry, Horse Studs and even incorporates Growers. Any Primary Industry, I guess. Anyone that wants help or support, just needs to ring the 0800 number, (0800787254). The phone holder will organise a facilitator to contact the client and tagether they can make a plan to move forward. RST offer support and a listening ear and can help direct clients to professional help if required. Help or support can range from budgeting and employment issues, through to Mental Health and everything in between.

RST also run a few events over the year, like the Surfing for farmers at Raglan or the Mountain biking at Te Miro. They have also organised barbeques, golf days, quiz nights and other events for farmers to attend, with the idea to get them off farm and engaging with other people. RST also play a pivotal role in adverse events, like floods or storms etc. or Civil Defence emergencies.

If you or someone you know is struggling with an issue, then we would encourage you to either ring the 0800 number or get them to ring. Often a lot of problems can be resolved over a cup of tea and a chat.



Matariki

Matariki can be translated as: Mata Riki - Tiny Eyes or Mata Ariki – the Eyes of God, it is of the most important of Māori Celebrations – the Māori New Year.

Matariki is a star cluster that appears in the early morning sky in New Zealand during the mid-winter months. It is called by its ancient Greek name, Pleiades or the Seven Sisters. There are many stories of 'The Seven Sisters' throughout Māori history and culture

Matariki is celebrated on different dates from May to the end of June because Tangaroa (God of the Sea) is not a single phase of the moon, but rather the last quarter period of the Lunar calendar, which is 354 days compared to the solar year of 365 days.

Historically, the stars of Matariki were also closely tied to planting, harvesting and hunting. It is believed that if the cluster is clear and bright, it will be a warm, productive season with an abundance of food (kai). However, if the Matariki, looks hazy or shimmering, then it will be a cold and a difficult growing season. Mātauranga Māori (ancestral knowledge and wisdom) is at the heart of celebrations of the Matariki public holiday, and it is a traditional time for;

- Remembrance Honouring those we have lost since the last rising of Matariki
- Celebrating the present Gathering together to give thanks for what we have
- Looking to the future Looking forward to the promise of a new year.

Traditionally, Matariki festivities included lighting ritual fires, making offerings and various celebrations to farewell the dead, honour ancestors and celebrate life. Nowadays, people across Aotearoa come together to remember their ancestors, share (kai) food, sing songs, tell stories and play music. Matariki is about reconnecting with your home and whānau (family). There are many ways to acknowledge the Māori New Year and observe the rising of Matariki;

- Take time to remember loved ones who are no longer with you
- Give thanks for the year that has passed
- Enjoy a Matariki feast together
- Plan for the next year
- Spend time with family and friends
- Write down your wishes for the year
- Plan to grow a garden

WHAT OUR LOCALS GET UP TO

Last month we mentioned Trinaka Kenny and her two friends who were selected to represent New Zealand in The Red Bull (can you make it) race from Barcelona Spain to Berlin in Germany.

They had paid return tickets plus a night's accommodation each night before & after the race. They were given a phone that could only be used for photos & had a G P S, and a sealed emergency kit which if they opened at they would be disqualified.

Some participants stayed on, but our girls came home to exams four days later.

The challenged started, they had no money no phones only a tray of Red Bull energy drinks to barter with.

They travelled some 2274 kms

Traded 108 cans of Red Bull (each time they reached a checkpoint they were topped back up to the original 24 cans they started with).

They participated in 30 adventure challenges from being lowered from the side of a 120-metre building to giving a motivational speech to a team - they literally fell over our N Z rowing team getting on their bus in Zurich so climbed on board & gave them a good luck - you can do it speech!

Their accommodation varied from sleeping on the beach in a very small tent to hitch hiking & being taken by a man who brought them a hotel room & meal that night & next morning. They also slept on the stairwell of some hotel with three other contestants.

There cans of Red Bull were swapped for ferry tickets, rail & bus tickets & also food.

They placed 77 vlogs on what they were doing each day.

On the seventh day before crossing the finishing line they summarized their 7 days The worst - carrying the trays of Red Bull Scariest - being dropped at a garage late at night. They got lucky - two soldiers who had come from the direction they wanted to go to turn around and took them back to the Checkpoint and then carried on their way. They were humbled by the generosity of people who helped them.

What did they miss - Music- with no phones they never realised how much they listen to music What an experience they have had. Thanks, Red Bull for giving them the opportunity of a lifetime.

They finished ranked 88 of approx. 300 teams with 11724 points.

Yes — they did make it!

PROJECT RURU 6th - 21st July

Project Ruru takes flight again. In 2022, fifteen artists made sculptures of our native owl in a variety of media. 'Find the Roosting Rurus' has become part of another adventure within the park. The park is located along the Waitakaruru Stream (Waitakaruru is Maori for owl by the water) so ruru hold a special place in our hearts. We want them to survive and thrive.



This year the Trust is working with **Forest & Bird** and other organizations to draw attention to our native owl (ruru/morepork). Although this native species is not on the brink of extinction, it is threatened by predators.

The project launches again on 6th July with related arts and environmental activities planned to follow through all of the July school holidays. Come any day or sign up for one of our family workshops https://www.sculpturepark.co.nz/workshops

Wingspan provided the park with a blueprint for making nest boxes of plywood and in 2023 we installed 18 of them to schools in the Waikato. **Hamilton Men's Shed** are making another 10 or more of these boxes from donated plywood from **Mitre10 Cambridge**. Like other years, we hope to install the boxes in locations where ruru boxes can provide better protection for nesting birds. Working with **Wintec** arboriculture students, the Trust plans to have these boxes installed in suitable trees for safer ruru nesting places throughout the Waikato.

Our aim is for all visitors, and especially children, to know more about our native owl before they leave the park.

District News

General rates rise drops to 11.9%

After deliberating for three days earlier this month, Waikato District Council has found ways to reduce its proposed general rate increase from 13.75% to 11.9%.

The new figure was determined as a result of a combination of factors including a decision to defer or re-scope a range of projects and to reduce reserve funds. The decision came after receiving 227 submissions on the draft 2024/25 Enhanced Annual Plan, with rates affordability raised as a concern by 149 submitters.

The final version of the 2024/25 Enhanced Annual Plan is expected to be adopted at a Council meeting on Wednesday 26 June.

The Council will continue to consult with the community on long-term budgets as we start to prepare a nine-year 2025-34 Long Term Plan for adoption next year.

Average value of residential housing up by 21%

The latest rating revaluation data from Quotable Value (QV) for all Waikato district properties has been released and shows the average value of residential housing in the district as at 1 October 2023 is up by 21% from the average value set in October 2020.



The new valuations will be used to calculate rates from 1 July. Rate increases are based on how your property value increase compares to the average. If your property has increased by the average amount, then your general rates increase will remain unchanged at 11.9%. If your property value has increased either more or less than the average, then your general rates increase will be affected accordingly.

New rating valuations are now available on the Rates Information Database (RID) on the Council's website (www.waikatodistrict.govt.nz/rid), and letters confirming the valuations are in the post. Property owners have until 24 July 2024 to lodge an objection with QV to the new rating valuation.

Policy and bylaw consultations coming soon

The Council's new draft Keeping of Animals bylaw is expected to be released for consultation on 26 June with submissions closing on 29 July. New draft policies on Gambling Venues and Road closures for Motor Sports events are also expected to be released for consultation during the same period. with a national public holiday on Friday 28 June.

We've always got LOADS to inspire you. Please, always feel free to pop in and chat if there is anything we can help you with.


With the colder winter months upon us, we have some lovely knitting patterns and yarn, as well as many sewing projects.

What to do this month:

Potatoes: Start chitting potatoes to give them a head start. Place seed potatoes in a single layer, on newspaper or in egg cartons, in a warm, well lit room out of direct sunlight. For large spuds, rub of all but for strongest sprouts. After 4-6 weeks plant out.

be hard pruned once a year because they fruit on new season's growth "Prune in winter back to about 5 leaves on each lateral" according to the New Zealand

Passionfruit growers association "Keeping airflow through the plant is important to prevent diseases that are transmitted by air and water. Passionfruit are gross feeders. Seaweed mixes and fish hydrolysates are good, as are calcium-nitrogen mixes. Use whatever you have in your shed, like tomato, potato and rose food. Passionfruit like magnesium during flowering times, so a sprinkling of Epsom salts is appreciated. Seaweed and fish fertilisers can be used as a foliar spray as well. Passionfruit don't like wet feet but like to be moist.

Prepare Strawberry Beds:

In warmer areas, strawberry plants will be in the shops now:

In cooler spots you may not see them until August or September In either case, its good practice to prepare your strawberry bed before planting. Choose a spot in full sun and free draining soil. If your soil is prone to water logging, plant on mounds, in a raised beds or containers. Prepare your soil at least two weeks before planting by adding 6-7cm of compost and a light layer of all purpose fertiliser. Dig them into the soil to a depth of 20cm. Water thoroughly and allow the area to sit for two weeks. When planting form mounded rows and plant 20-40cm apart and plant deep enough to the crown of the plant is even with the soil. Water and mulch around plants to keep moisture in. Feed in late winter-early spring —a liquid tomato fertiliser is ideal Feed again when you see fruit forming.

Ladies a Plate

Rachael's Slices -two different slices with the same base

Chocolate Base for both -

125 g Butter

½ cup sugar

1 egg

1 tsp Baking powder

1 tsp Vanilla essence

1 cup high grade flour

2 tbsp cocoa

Cream butter, sugar, essence, until creamy. Add egg and beat well.

Add other ingredients mix until together. Press into slice tin. Set aside.

TOPPINGS: either Oero or Berry

Oero –break up packet oero biscuits and lay across Chocolate base then in cake mixer beat 250 tub cream cheese ¼ cup sugar and egg Whip until creamy, spread over slice then sprinkle chocolate chips on top Bake for approx 40 to 50 mins on 185 until golden and cooked.

Strawberry Topping- set aside chocolate base as above. In mixer mix together 2.5 cups shredded coconut 1 tin condensed milk drop red food colouring (Gel is Best) 10ne packet dried strawberry's. May need to add more coconut if bit wet. Press on top of chocolate base and approx 30 mins on 185.

When cool melt packet of Donovan's chocolate chips and spread on to slice Cut as chocolate goes firm with hot knife and right there

Overselling

Recently I had the displeasure of watching a seasoned professional computer technician attempt to sell an overpriced, over-powered laptop to a novice client who only wanted it for occasional document editing. The situation wasn't such that I could intervene, but it put me of a mind to write an article about this practice. Despite most people not needing much in the way of power, computer salespeople will often line their own pockets by recommending the most expensive laptops and desktops available. Since the general consumer doesn't know too much about computer components, this con is not hard.

The majority of folk are just using computers to check emails, browse the web, edit documents, and you don't need a lot of grunt for that. It's only when you start getting into audio/video editing, photo editing, CAD, garning and the like, that power demands start to move the money meter northward; but even then, people often don't need as much as they think. For the average user most laptops or desktop computers made in the past 10 years are fine, provided they have a solid-state drive, at least 3-4 CPU cores, at least 4GB of RAM and are running Windows 10 or 11 (another reminder that Windows 10 will stop receiving security updates as of Oct '25, so please upgrade to Windows 11 before then). For Macs the specs are similar, and they need to be on the most recent of the Mac OS. Upgrading operating systems and upgrading to solid state drives is an easy practice for a computer technician and doesn't cost the consumer an arm and a leg. For the sake of reference, when buying a new computer most users should be fine with something which meets the following specifications (and as always, avoid HP due to their track record):

- Intel i5/i7/i9 or AMD Ryzen CPU, no more than 4 years old
- 8 gigabytes of RAM
- A 512GB or larger Solid State or (preferably) NVMe drive

Salespeople tend to couch suggestions to buy more expensive kit in terms of it lasting longer, having fewer issues, or being more future-proof - these are untrue. I've had \$4000 laptops fail within 3 years and \$600 laptops last for 10 years. The brand and specific model have a bigger influence on longevity than the price. In terms of futureproofing, the correct computer is the one you need *right at the moment*. In 2 years' time your current computer will be worth a fraction of what you paid for it, and the extra money you could potentially use to buy a more expensive model is better spent buying a newer model later on - which will always be faster than your current expensive model. This is, perhaps, why I never did well as a computer salesperson; too honest. And also the job sucks. Does your computer suck? Phone Matt at 0211348576 or email info@homepcsupport.co.nz

LOOKING FOR SOMETHING TO DO IN THE SCHOOL HOLIDAYS?

Only a few weeks remain to see <u>Six Extinctions</u> at Waikato Museum Te Whare Taonga o Waikato. Proving to be a hit with dinosaur fans young and old, the epic exhibition must close on Sunday 21 July 2024. With deadly prehistoric predators, replica fossils, and a life-sized cast of the largest Tyrannosaurus rex ever discovered, <u>Six Extinctions</u> is one of the biggest exhibitions ever undertaken by Waikato Museum. <u>Six Extinctions</u> takes a journey through 485 million years, with visitors meeting the top predators from each geological period and learning what caused their demise. As well as the five previous mass extinction events, the eye-opening exhibition also explores the sixth and current extinction crisis – climate change – which is the first caused by a single species, humans. Museum staff report that the standout display for many visitors is the replica of a huge Tyrannosaurus rex known as 'Scotty'. The skeleton measures 13 metres long by 4 metres high and recreates the most complete fossil of its kind, discovered by palaeontologists in Saskatchewan, Canada in 1991. The life-sized cast represents the Cretaceous period which ended 66 million years ago due to the impact of a 10-kilometre wide asteroid. It is open at Waikato Museum every day until 21 July 2024. Tickets can be pre-booked online or purchased at Waikato Museum in person on the day of your visit.







We are so grateful to our incredible PTA for all their hard work and efforts to help us achieve our goal of a new junior playground.


A very popular space, we were excited to open the playground this term, weeks ahead of schedule, for the children (and a few adults) to enjoy.
