#### **Tamahere Country Market**


The next market, organised by St Stephen's Church, is on Saturday the 18<sup>th</sup> of October.








Local Body Elections

You can post your papers in the free envelope **by Tuesday 7**<sup>th</sup> **October 2025** or by leaving your voting papers at designated ballot boxes.



# Eureka Calf Club

Going back through the archives not a lot could be found to, give you some history. The earliest calf club was registered in 1911, with boys and girls raring their calves, to learn about animal care, to be able to assist parents on the farm during busy times.

The first record I could find was in 1937, when the Eureka Calf club was affiliated to the Girls & Boys Agricultural Club Group. I can only assume that calf clubs were indeed held at Eureka schools, prior to this.

Round the country calf clubs are held in late September early October, with the overall champions going on to combined group days and the culmination of the top calves going through to Agricultural Days, where adults and children show the best of the breeds. It has always been very competitive in country areas and for the children to have the best dairy type and or overall champions was a prize to aim for. In later years beef calves were introduced and this too was a friendly competition between beef breeders

The children's calves are judged in rearing, leading and dairy and beef types, where lambs and goats are judged on rearing, calling, leading and type.



#### Kids in the Kitchen

#### Great easy recipes with staple ingredients to encourage children into cooking

#### **Toffee**

A child of six can make this toffee - it never fails to set

2 cups sugar

2 dessertspoon butter

2 tsp vinegar

6 dessertspoon water

Put all together into saucepan and boil for 20 minutes but do not stir. Pour into greased plate or dish to set

#### **Mighty Muesli Bars**

2 cups rolled oats

½ cup chocolate chips

34 cup raisins

75g butter

34 cup sunflower seeds

1 cup condensed milk

½ cup peanuts (chopped)

Preheat oven to 160. Line 20x30 cm tin with Baking paper. Make sure paper comes up sides of tin. Put oats, raisins, seeds, nuts and chocolate chips in a bowl. Add melted butter and condensed milk; stir well, Press evenly into tin. Bake 30-35 minutes until golden. Cool in tin for 10 minutes, before cutting into bars.

#### **Rice Bubble Cakes**

5 cups rice bubbles

100g butter

½ cup sugar

2 tbsp honey

Put butter, sugar and honey in a pot. Boil slowly until it turns a golden colour. Put in the rice bubbles and stir. Put the mixture into a greased tray. Cut when cold.

#### **Mini Quiches**

6 eggs

250g chopped bacon

1 large onion (finely chopped)


2 cups grated tasty cheese

Sliced sandwich bread

finely chopped parsley

Beat eggs; add onion, cheese, bacon and parsley. Mix well. Lightly butter bread, remove crusts and place buttered side down into patty pans. Fill with mixture. Bake at 180 for approx 20-25 minutes or until light brown.





The sense of achievement you feel when you grow something from seed is enormous, plus it the most economical way to grow a crop

Seeds are living things and have a limited shelf life. How a seed is stored and how fresh it is will determine its success. Packet seeds come in a foil sachet, once the sachet is opened the seed is exposed to light, moisture and heat causing it to deteriorate, and should be used within six months. Seeds have a basic requirement to germinate – water, warmth and sometimes light, although most seeds can germinate initially in the shade.

**Sewing in trays** Seed raising trays with good drainage is important or reuse the 6 cell trays from previous purchased plants work well. Fill the container with seed raising mix to 1 cm below the top. Level and firm down. Water the seed tray as this will close up small cracks in the mix and prevent the small roots of the germinating seed from drying out once they start growing. Scatter the seeds evenly over the surface and cover lightly and evenly with seed raising mix. Cover the tray with glass, clear plastic or a sheet of paper to keep seeds moist and warm during germination. When the seed germinates and seedlings emerged from the soil, uncover and move the tray to a warm, sunny, sheltered position. Keep the seed raising mix moist as it can dry out very quickly.

Summer staples like tomatoes, basil, chillies, pumpkins, eggplants capsicums, cucumbers, zucchinis, beans and sweet corn will be ready to plant outside as soon as the weather is constantly warm(from late October). Before transplanting, reduce watering to harden off seedlings. Plant seedlings outside: plant cauliflower broccoli and cabbage, lettuce, spinach, celery, silver beet, bok choy, onions and spring onions. If the ground is waterlogged, hold off until it dries, as little growth happens in saturated soils.

**Prune feijoas:** Your last chance for pruning feijoas is early spring. Aim to remove dense growth to allow more light into the centre of the trees. Feijoas can handle significant haircuts, so if plants have become gigantic, you can safely reduce them by 50 percent.

**Nurture citrus:** An application of citrus fertiliser will give plants a welcome boost now. Pick fruit before it over- ripens and falls from the tree. Check for whitefly and mites on a regular basis and use an insect spray to control them. Once the weather warms they multiply rapidly.



#### Tamahere-Woodlands Councillors' update September 2025

#### Final reminder for elections 2025

You should have received your voting papers in the post by now if you were registered on the electoral roll by 1 August at your current address. If you have not received your voting papers then please enquire about casting a special vote - which you can request from the Council or from Election Services (ph 0800 922 822). Voting closes at 12 noon on election day (Saturday 11 October). The Council's electoral officer recommends you post your vote by 7 October, or hand deliver it to a Council office or library after that.

#### Calling all library lovers

Just a reminder for library lovers in the Tamahere-Woodlands Ward that your rates allow you to use both the Waikato District library services and Hamilton City libraries, whichever is more convenient. If the nearest Waikato District library at Ngaruawahia is too distant, check out the digital library services — including eBooks, eAudiobooks, movie streaming, and online learning — or have your chosen book delivered to the Tamahere office to pick up.

Hamilton City libraries include Rototuna, Chartwell, Hillcrest, and the Central library in Garden Place. Hillcrest Library is temporarily closed following last month's fire at the back of the dairy, next door in the same building – but the city is considering setting up a "pop-up" library while they investigate the extent of the damage and what the next steps are for the building. Check the Hamilton City Libraries website or Facebook page for updates.

#### Rolling out our Speed Management Plan

If you made a submission on our speed management plan (SMP) for local roads and are wondering when the plan will be implemented, the Council is still awaiting sign-off from the Director of Land Transport. Apparently there have been delays in reviewing all SMPs nationwide. The Council has set aside a modest budget for speed limit signage where needed and hope to be able to implement agreed post-consultation changes in the new year.

#### Upcoming legislation and policy statements guiding local government

The Government has recently issued a number of policy statements and is seeking comment on draft legislation that is expected to influence the operations of local government. Among these changes are:

- The draft *Government Policy Statement on Housing and Urban Development* sets out the government's long-term direction for housing and urban development, alongside five priority actions aimed at addressing the causes of Aotearoa New Zealand's housing challenges. The priorities include supporting housing growth, reforming the resource management system, resetting investment to better support those most in need, improving efficiency and competition in building and construction, and strengthening rental markets.
- Resource Management Reforms: Going for Housing Growth. This is part of the Government's broader plan to tackle NZ's ongoing housing shortage. It's structured around system changes (three pillars) to address the underlying causes of this shortage by freeing up land for development and removing planning barriers.
- The *Planning Act* and *Natural Environment Act* legislation will be the combined legislative result of the consultation on the Resource Management Act discussion documents and are expected to follow the consultation on the remaining Going for Housing Growth pillars.
- The *Local Government Systems Improvements Bill* sets out to remove the four wellbeings from the Local Government Act and widen the Department of Internal Affairs' powers to set mandatory measures on non-financial performance. This is the first tranche of an Omnibus Bill with a second tranche coming later this year.

#### The even *more* alternative web browsers

Have you heard about 'Salt Typhoon'? This is a chinese hacking operation which infiltrated 200 companies across 80 countries in 2024. The CIA casually stated that they now probably have information on every american. How? Well, many of the companies infiltrated were large, but also, distribution of personal information on the web via 'data broking' is widespread. This is when a company - say, Amazon - sells anonymized data about a large number of users to a third party - maybe a government actor, or a private company - ostensibly for market research purposes. The problem is that your data can be easily de-anonymized, if the buyer owns a website you have an account with. They find out the exact times you've logged in, in the past, then compare that against the anonymized data in order to identify the user. This is one method of several.

So any state actor can use this anonymized data, plus login times found in breaches like the ones orchestrated by Salt Typhoon, to identify vast numbers of users, their web browsing habits, what websites they visit, their personal statistics and more. How is this useful? Well, if you're trying to manipulate people in a foreign power hierarchy, you want to find out what they don't want others to know (web browsing habits, emails etc) and what they are vulnerable to (how many kids they have, their partner, and suchforth). Which brings us to the issue of browser privacy. Most of us are not important enough for any government to care about, let alone investigate, but still, its nice to be cautious sometimes. Microsoft's 'Edge' browser, their newer Outlook email client, and Google's Chrome browser send information about which websites you visit, what you type and when, back to their servers. According to both companies, the data is only used for their targeted ad services, but both have been known to lie (Chrome was found to be sending information back to base even when users were browsing in 'incognito mode').

Mozilla's Firefox browser, unfortunately, has started sending information home too; purportedly to gather data to power their new Al initiative. Firefox has been getting more annoying and confusing for mainstream users for years, and I think for many this has been the last straw. Which leaves us with only one choice; alternative browsers. I looked at a bunch so you don't have to, and the best one for most users is **Librewolf**. This is based on Firefox's source code, but with telemetry and various other annoyances disabled, as well as privacy-focused features enabled by default. It includes an adblocker and is compatible with Firefox's extensions/bookmarks. Other alternatives are numerous but boil down to a few solid candidates:

*Brave* - similar to Librewolf but based on Chrome's source code instead. Unfortunately the company behind it has been involved with scandal after scandal and I don't trust them.

*Mullvad* - goes harder than either of the above on the privacy front, but too far for non-expert users. Will break many websites and is hard for novices to use.

So there you have it. My recommendation for a new web browser that won't get you tracked so easily in 2025 is Librewolf. Or you can stick with Edge and have that page of clickbait news rocket into your vision every time you open a new browser tab.
